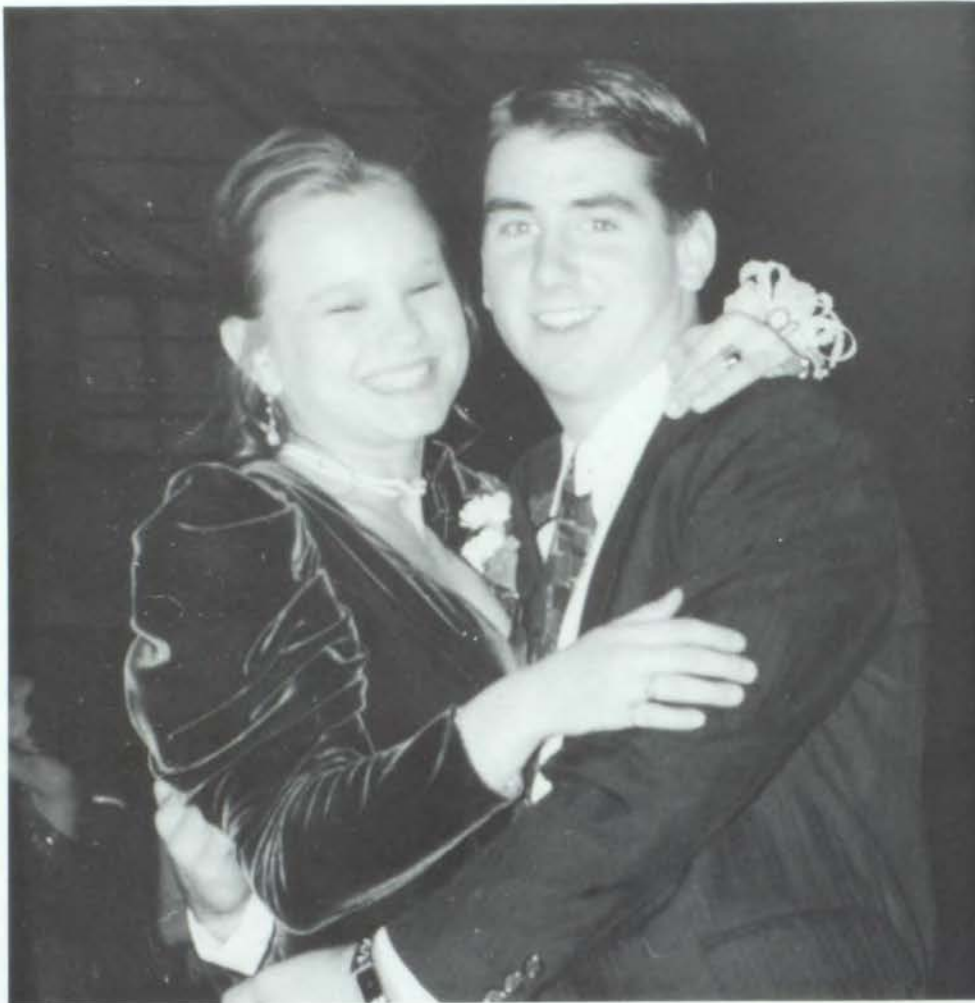

Sweetheart '94

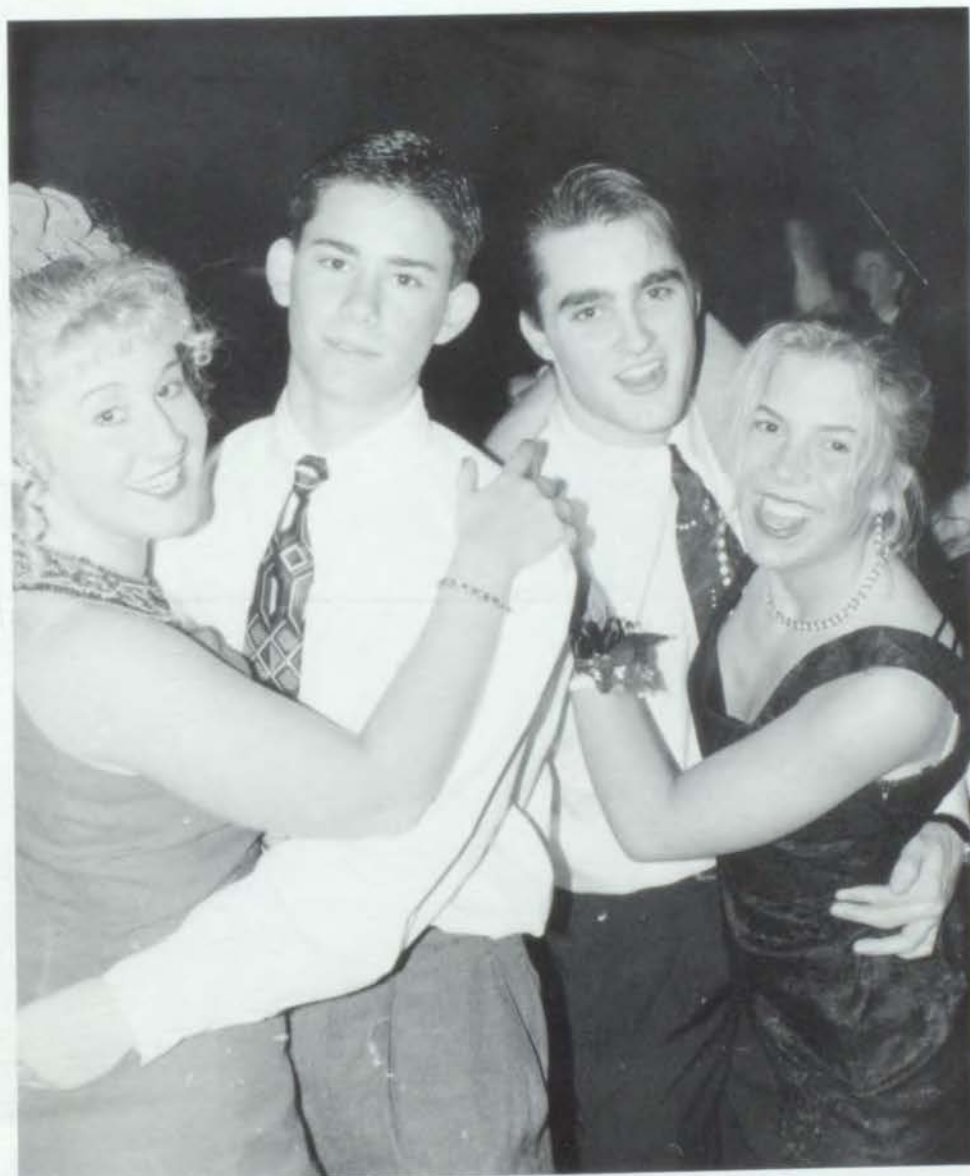

The Dance was on Saturday, February 26. The theme was Escape to the Orient, with colors of red, gold, and black.

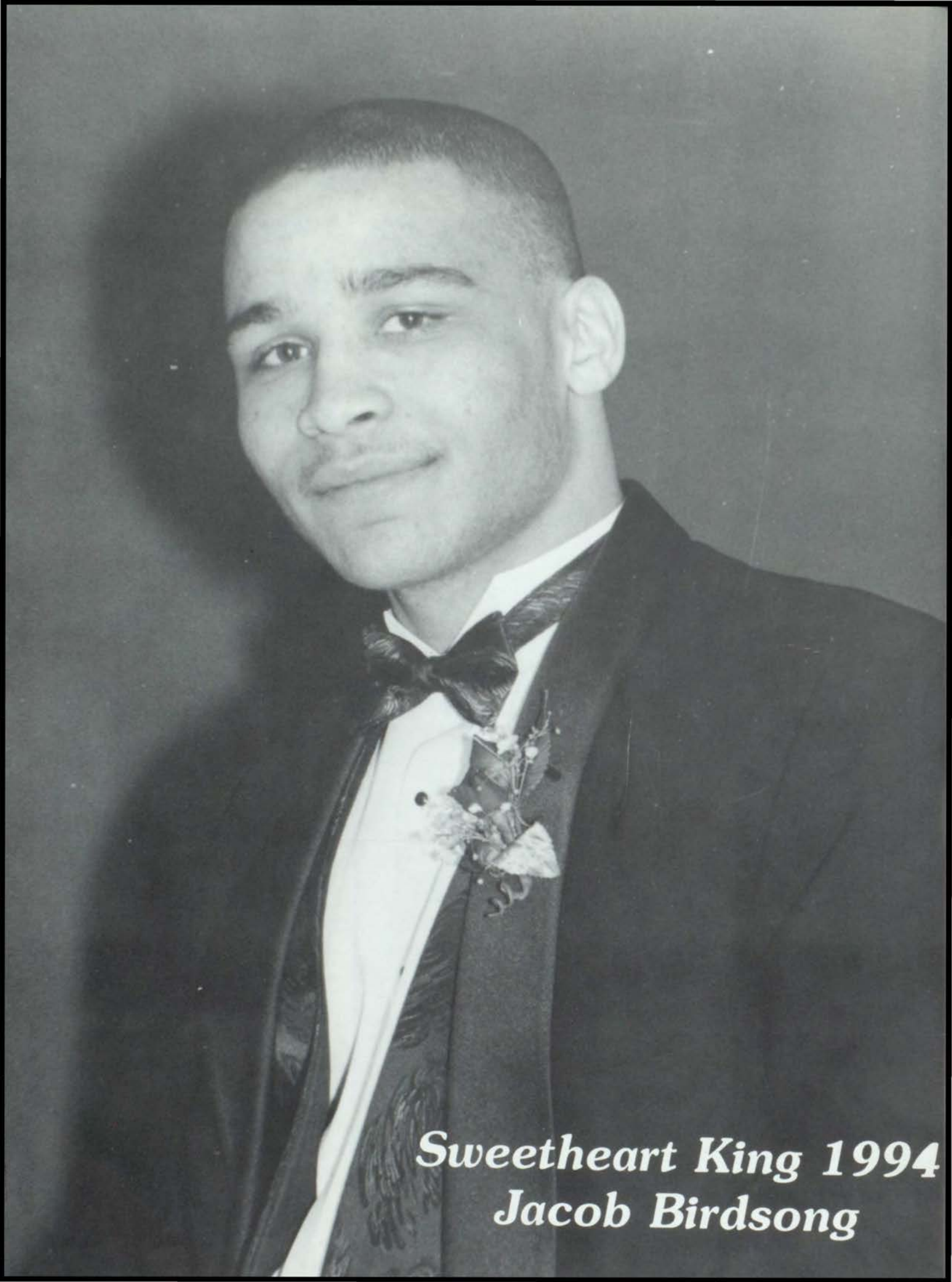

Vive la FRANCE!

For more than a year, 28 students anticipated what would probably be one of the most memorable experiences of their entire high school career. These students fundraised and saved their own money in order to raise the \$2,000 needed to travel to Paris, France in March of 1994.

In past years the trip had included a family stay where students would reside with a selected host family. Since the board would not allow the students to miss that much school, Mrs. Barmann had to cut the family stay and tour Paris during spring break in order to make the trip possible.

On March 25 the students said their good-byes and boarded the plane at KCI airport to Chicago and from there they flew 8 hours to Paris. When they landed it was Saturday morning in France but only Friday evening in K.C. This caused the students much fatigue but didn't affect their excitement to see the sights scheduled for that day. These sights included the Eiffel Tower, L'Arch de Triomphe, Le Louvre, and Notre Dame. They were chaperoned by Mrs. Barmann, Dr. Condra, Mrs. Condra and Mrs. Rainen.

One of the sights that the students named most memorable was Montparnasse. Montparnasse is a tall building with an incredible view of the city at night from the top. "Anything we saw at night was beautiful," said Molly Roos. "Those are my most memorable moments."

Giverny was also mentioned as one of the most memorable places visited. This was the first time Mrs. Barmann had taken students there because it opens up in April. They traveled there by train to see the house and gardens of French impressionist, Claude Monet. Another place toured outside Paris was The Loire Valley. Located there were two chateaux, Chenonceau and Chambord. "I loved the beautiful gardens. The castles were so magnificent and ancient. I liked to think about the royalty that roamed the very halls I walked through," said one student.

Not only did the group view historical monuments but they actually experienced Paris life. Each day they dealt with French people in stores and restaurants. "I learned the differences between our cultures," stated Ralph Hailey. "Like the public display of affection is more...liberal and I wasn't used to that!" Melissa Duffett happened to appreciate that aspect of the culture. "I liked the openness and forwardness of the French," she says.

Other differences the students encountered were the sidewalk cafes, shopping, prices. "I liked how the stores were so close together. It made it easier to shop!" said Shannon Montgomery. One student found a difference in the bathroom when she couldn't figure out how to flush the toilet. "I was really embarrassed," she says. "It took me an hour to figure out and there was a line of people waiting on me to finish."

Becky Calvert was surprised at the price differences. "They were horrendous! For my last

coke I paid five dollars!" Some like Jill Kringle and Molly Roos didn't suffer any culture shock. "I felt comfortable there," said Molly Roos. "There wasn't a big difference." "I tried to speak the language," said Jill Kringle. "I wasn't afraid to ask questions. I communicated well with the French and I got around the city with two other students pretty easily. It made the trip more enjoyable because we had a lot of freedom to do and see what interested us the most."

The students also developed new relationships during the trip. "I made friends with people in my own school," said Chris West. To Becky Calvert the things she will miss most about France is her roomies, Julie Gordon and Kate Hankins. "We learned a lot about each other, We would stay up late talking about the trip and other stuff." Upon their return a student commented to Dr. Condra that he seemed like a real person now after the trip.

To Melissa Duffett the educational benefits of the trip were obvious. "It helps us learn about a different culture. We realized that everyone is not Americanized. We could see how people live differently." Mrs. Barmann prepared us constantly," Mrs. Rainen said. "We were always learning something new. The trip was like an extension of the classroom. The trip is also beneficial because we find student go back. Mrs. Rainen feels that if you educate people they will appreciate what they see. She thought it was fun to hear the skills that were taught and she was amazed at the amount students knew when they toured the city.

The students that got to travel on this great voyage came back to America changed. They brought back a bit of Paris with them in not only the souvenirs purchased but with the adventures and places they experienced. "I'll always remember being stuck on the Eiffel Tower with Melissa Duffett," said Jill Kringle, "or locked outside the Palace of Versailles in the rain," she adds. "Kostas, the French crêpe man, is something that no one will let me forget!" says Melissa Duffett laughing. Molly Roos exclaims "The trip has been a dream of mine since I was a little girl."

Mrs. Barmann summed up the trip to France by saying, "Trips to France allow students to see, breathe, and embrace what they have learned in the classroom. They enable students to cultivate a love for French culture. Students see the world with eyes beyond Kansas City. They discover that they can live among people of different cultures and get along well."

This excursion was finalized on May 3, 1994 with a pizza party at the home of Dr. Condra and Mrs. Condra. A home video of the trip was shown and pictures were exchanged. Dr. Condra remarks, "It's unfortunate that not everyone gets a chance to experience a trip like this. It's a wonderful experience. I'd be tickled to accompany another group of students in the future."

Chamber Orchestra

Another new music group that formed was string orchestra, an elite group of selected string players. Mrs. Setser felt that creating a chamber orchestra was an even harder task than making the full thing. "It was difficult," she says, "to arrange a time and place to practice." Since the string orchestra did not have a separate class hour to work, they had to interrupt full orchestra time or be pulled out of that class a few days out of the week in order to practice.

String orchestra was organized so that students could be challenged with more difficult music and work on technique. They also received extended time for solo work, and "...everyone's needs are better met," stated Setser.

Activities for the string orchestra, besides the usual concerts, included contests at William Jewel, where they earned a 1 rating. On April 22-24, the string orchestra--along with several other Winnetonka music groups--traveled to St. Louis for the *Great Show Me State Showdown* at Lafayette High School. They placed first at the sweepstakes competition, where they were presented with a trophy at Busch Stadium.

"There are only six sweepstakes winners in the country," said Setser. Winnetonka Chamber Orchestra is one of them. As a result of this honor, chamber orchestra was invited to play at Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. next spring.

"For them to play that well," Setser remarked, "it's amazing. I know that next year's group will be awesome."

"I was very honored to be chosen to play in full orchestra, and chamber as well--there's a certain satisfaction combined with a feeling of achievement that is obtained when you play an instrument, especially in a group," said one orchestra member. "You work together to succeed in a common goal; not only that, but you make friends with people who share an interest.

"It also pushes you to do better, play better, and work harder so as to qualify. In this way, you can be an asset to the group. Most importantly, it's something that becomes a part of you. The ability to play is something that one can love, keep, and appreciate throughout his/her entire life."

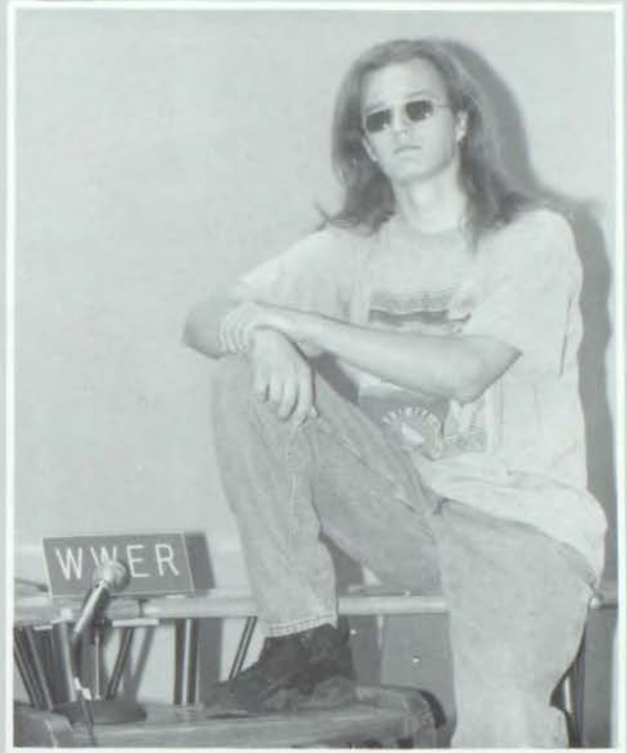

When I filled out my application for my exchange program, I wrote that I wanted to get to know the country with the reputation of being the land of unlimited possibilities, the land of the free.

The classrooms are too small and without any windows. I was even told that there are no windows at school because of tornados. But why do other schools around here have windows then?!

Anyway, then there are guards outside who make sure that nobody leaves the school without official permission, and being late is punishable by detentions and ISS. I never knew there was such a thing as an in-school suspension!

Besides that, I think that American high schools really offer fun classes. Choir, band, orchestra, keyboarding, psychology, etc... are classes that German schools don't have. There is such a big selection of classes that students can choose them in consideration of their interests and abilities.

What I also liked are the extracurricular activities. The sports teams are much more competitive, and therefore are better than our teams usually are. The drama department does a really good job in promoting actors and actresses with the plays and musicals.

While some students probably join a school club to get to know people and have fun, German teenagers go to cafes and bars. Since I am sixteen, I can legally drink and go in every bar and every dance club I want to. It seemed like my life was going backwards when I got all my old prohibitions again.

An advantage that American teenagers have, though, is being able to drive at sixteen. Unfortunately, almost no organization allows their exchange students to drive. While in Europe the distances are pretty short and I can go by bike or walk almost everywhere, here I can't even buy myself chewing gum without asking somebody to take me. And that is not just annoying for the people who have to drive but for the exchange students as well.

But even if I've got a lot of these restrictions, and even if America was not what I expected, I had many, many great experiences. I got to know things that I would have never known without this exchange year. I got to know some wonderful people and after all I am pretty sure I will miss the famous "American way of life."

Co-captain Katie Baker said, "At first I thought it was going to be hard, but the practices got easier and we began to work as team."

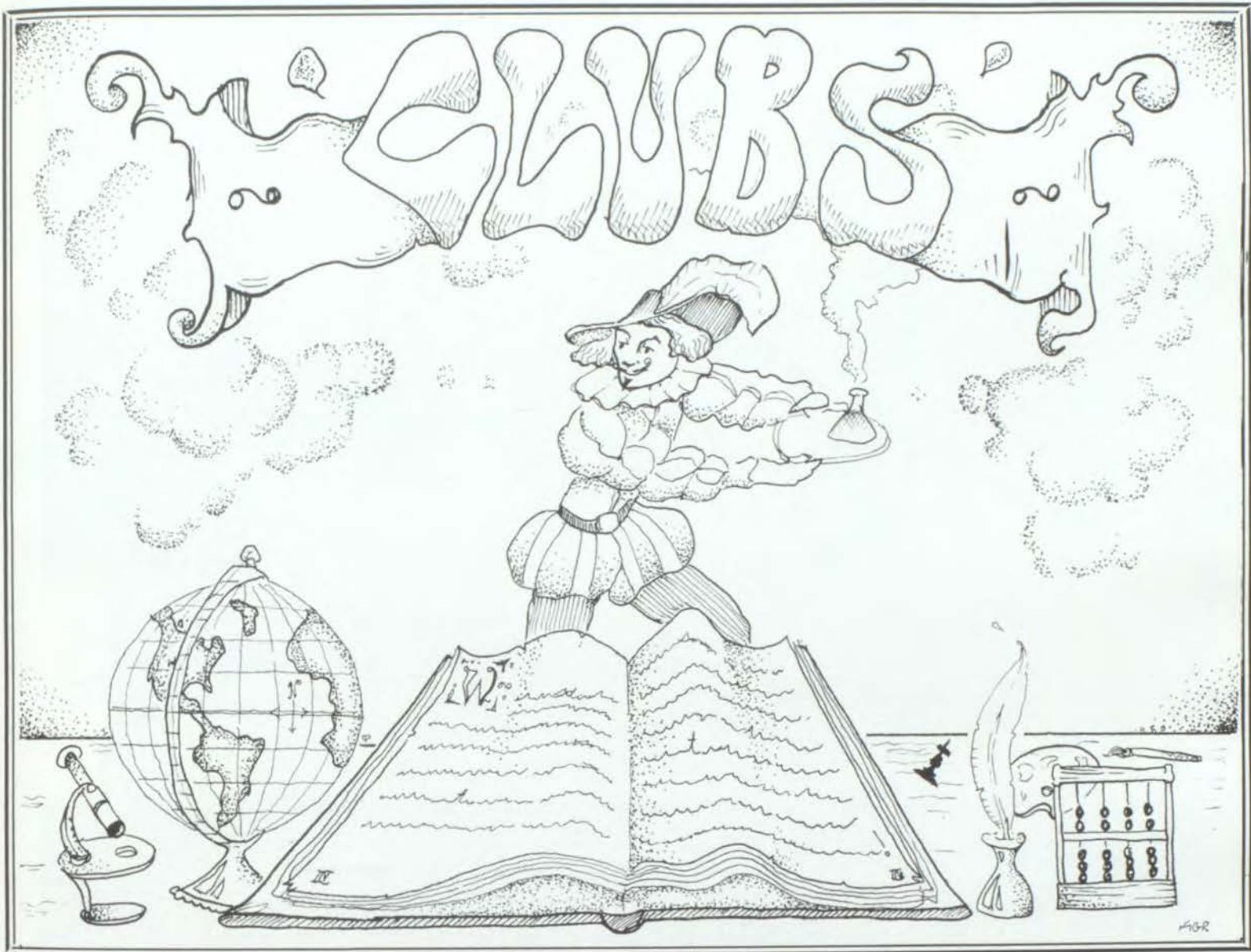

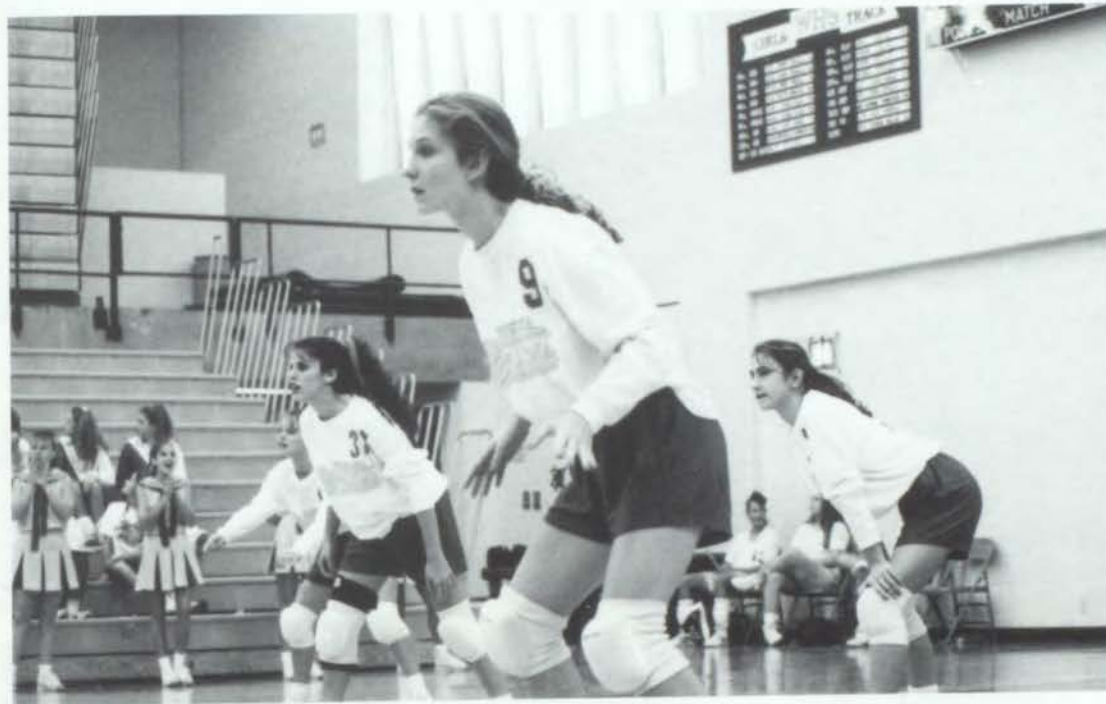

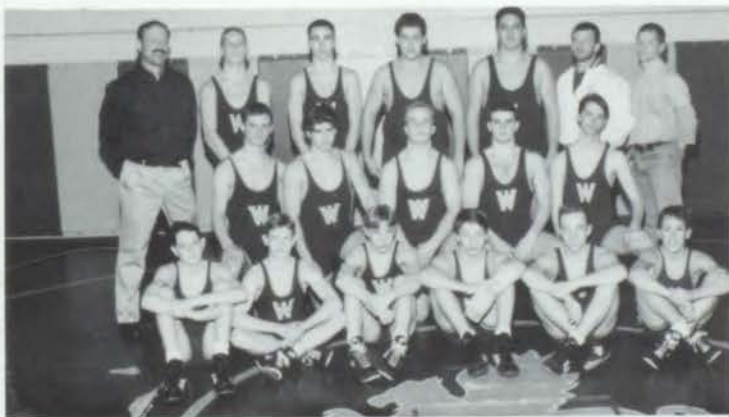

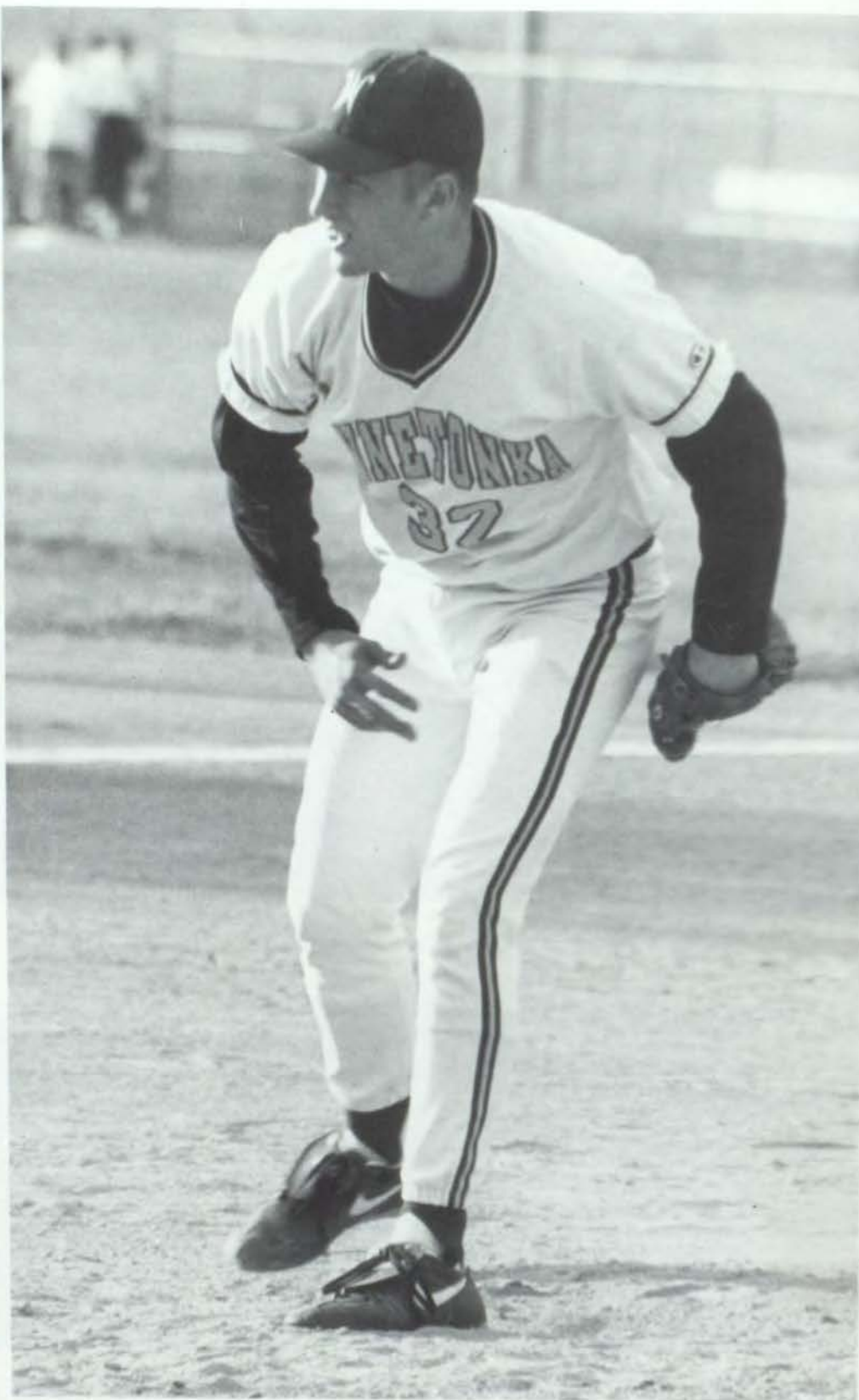

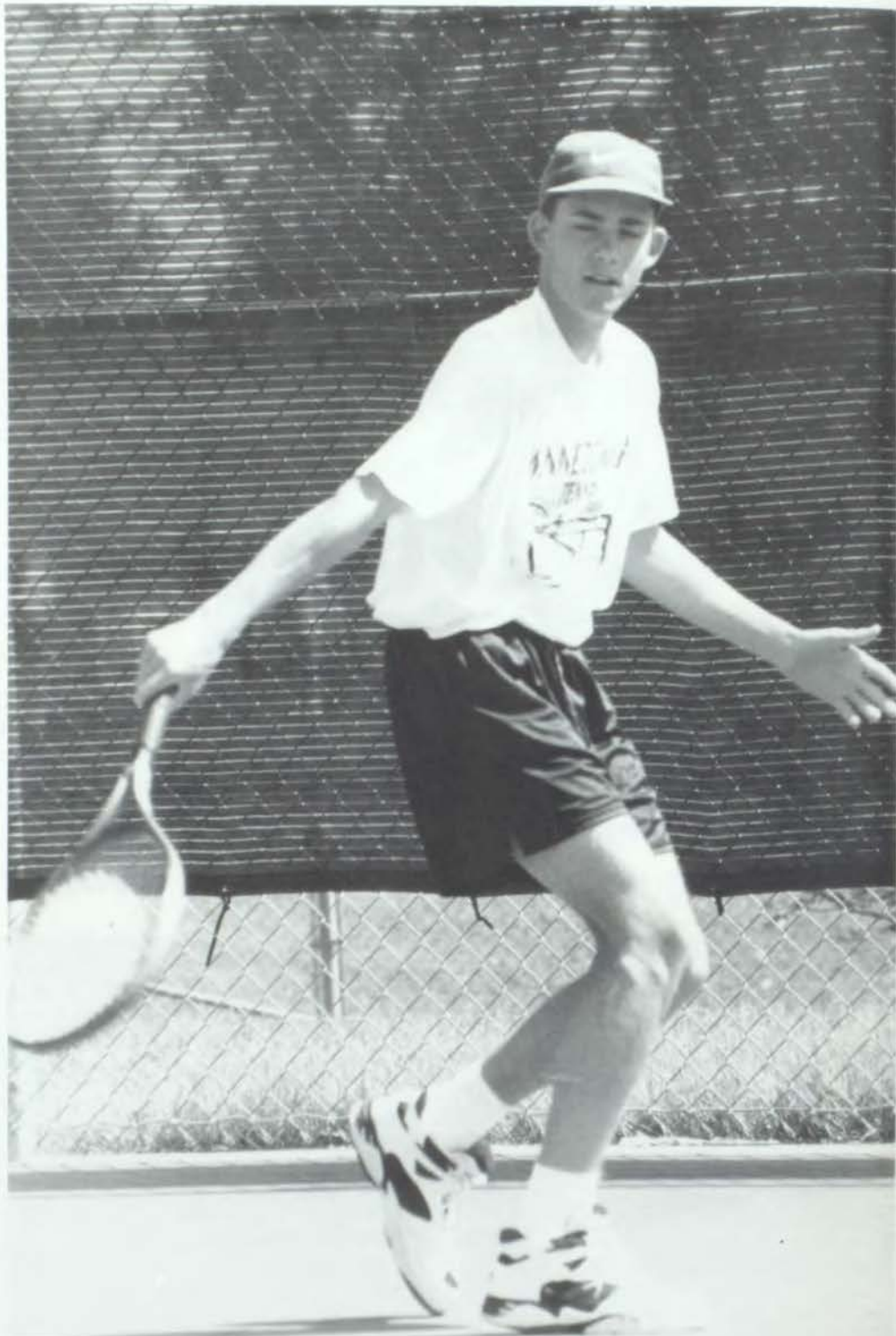

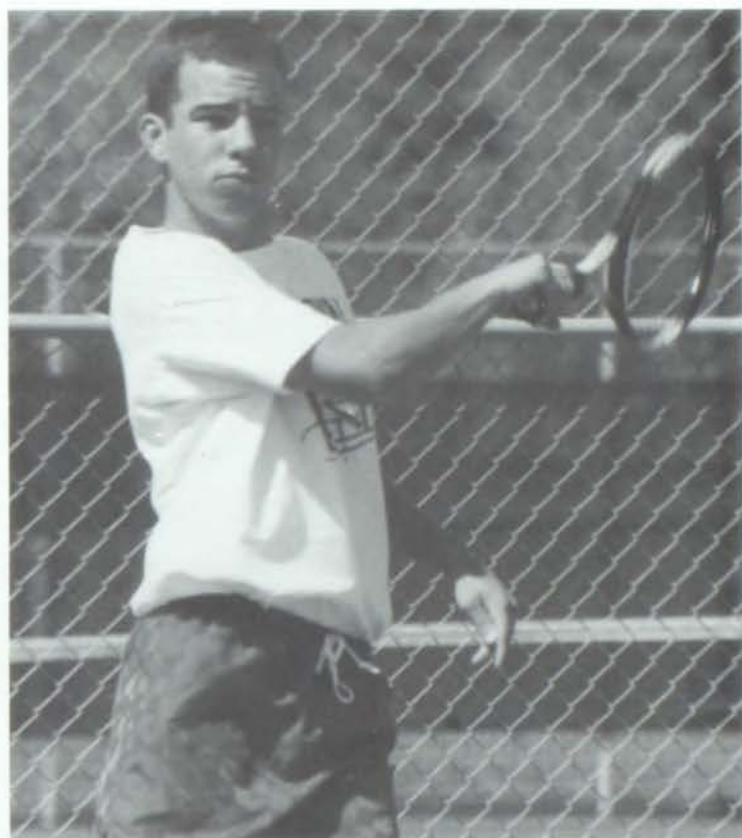

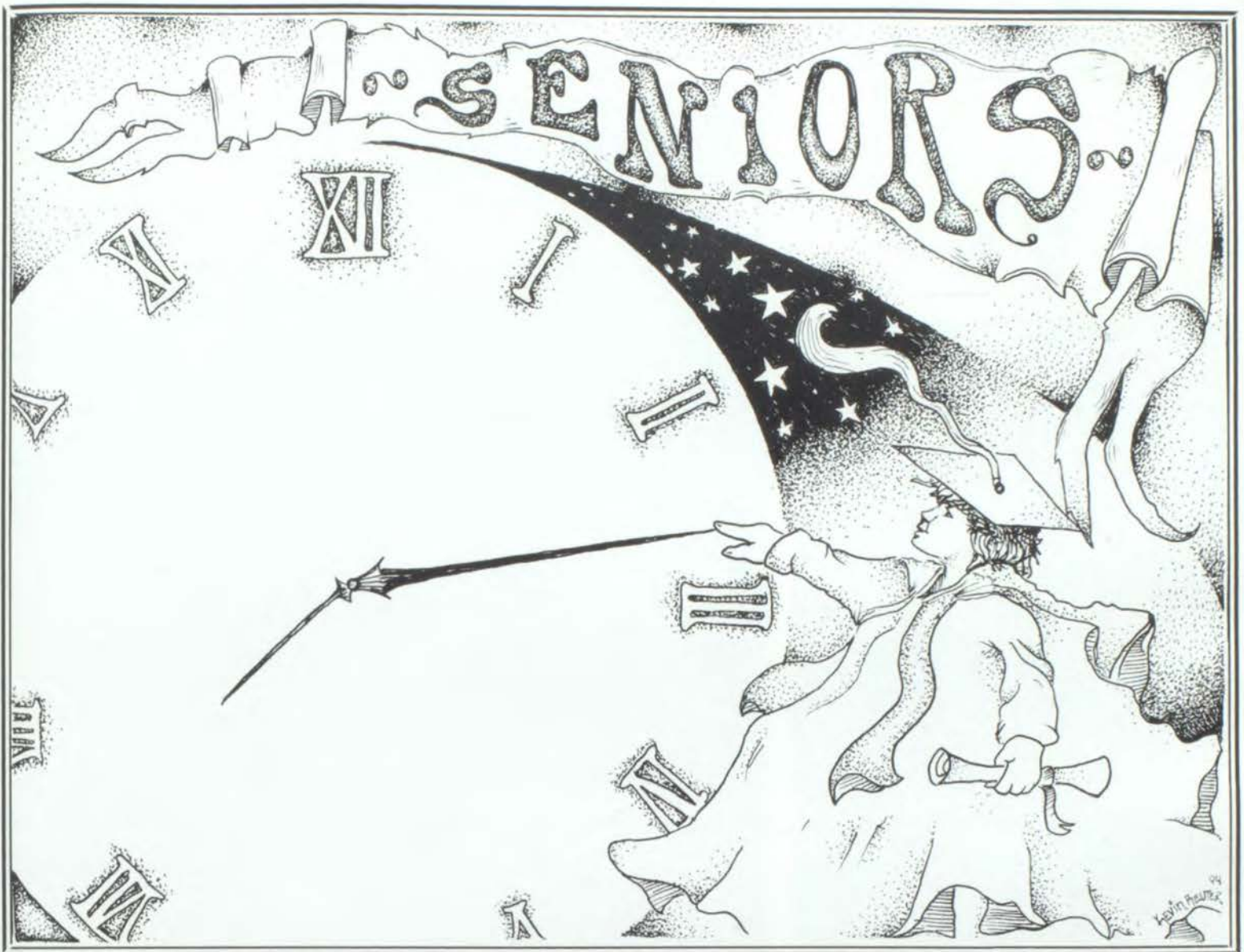

"I also plan on throwing away my alarm clock," she said.

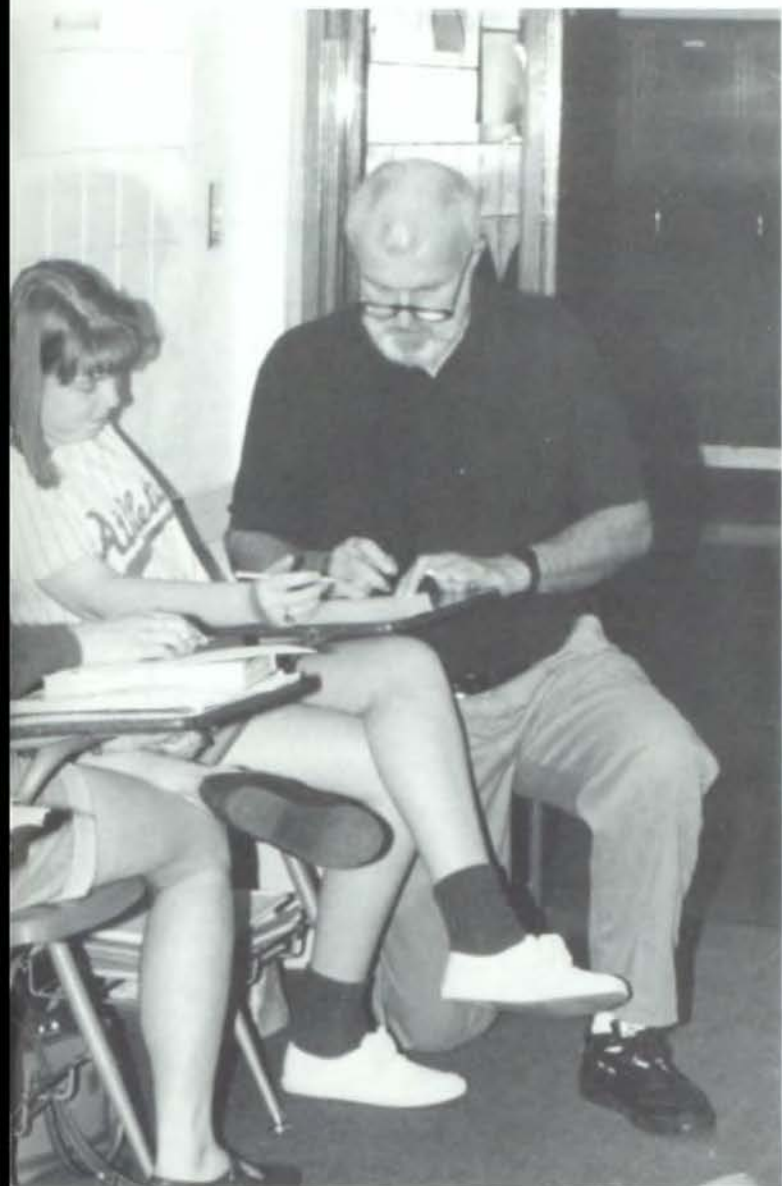
"She is a very nice and understanding person," said Mrs. Carol Hakes, who has worked beside Mrs. Class for several years.

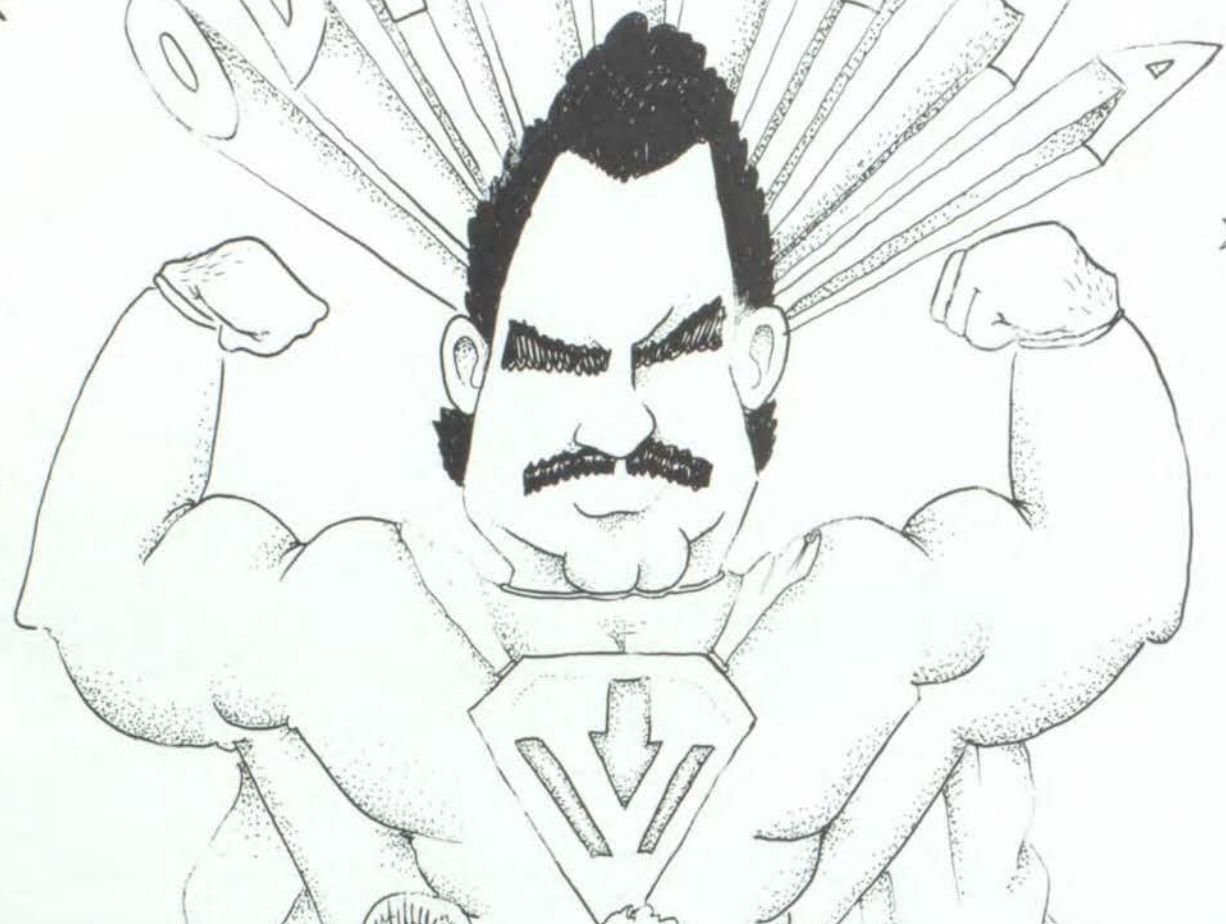
