
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
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#### Beginnings...

#### Hardships...






Sometimes I must journey alone for only in solitude can I become more aware of myself. It gives me a chance to think about life, the future, about me. It's the only way I can know the real me.





# HOMECOMING ROYALTY Homecoming '74 reaches its climax










Each year I realize more that I must relate with my teachers.

By having good relations with my teachers, I become more receptive and in turn acquire more knowledge.















# BOARD OF EDUCATION Dr. O.L. Plucker, Superintendent of



#### FOREIGN LANGUAGES Students offered foreign language






# New journalism classes open up




### FINE ARTS **Two-dimensional** art is examined








#### MATHEMATICS







































## VARSITY FOOTBALL Big Red's annual Red-White game











### VARSITY FOOTBALL Big Red looked for victory in the



## JV FOOTBALL Wyandotte's JV squad can look

















## Big Red's Cagers began to practice





## SOPHOMORE BASKETBALL Sophomores took an active interest









Track practice began as the season approached. This hurdler stretches to improve his skills.











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



# NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY Highlights of Senior year
























# Graduation plans bring excitement

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


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
