This collection contains three oversize photographs of the WDAF Radio Studio from the 1920s and 1940s-1950s. The station began broadcasting on June 2, 1922, from the basement of the old *Kansas City Star* building at 18th and Grand.

Historical Sketch

WDAF Radio began broadcasting on June 2, 1922. The station is recognized as the first in Kansas City. Owned by *The Kansas City Star*, the station originally broadcasted from the newspaper's headquarters at 18th and Grand with the aid of two large radio towers constructed on the roof. WDAF soon became an affiliate of the National Broadcasting Company (NBC). In 1949, the *Star* branched into television with the launch of WDAF-TV on channel four. The newspaper sold both stations in 1958.

Scope and Content Note

This collection consists of three oversized, black and white photographs of the WDAF radio studios and its staff. Two of the photos are dated from the 1920s. The third photo appears to have been taken later, perhaps in the 1940s or 1950s.

The photographs are large-scale copies. When the copies were made and where the originals are is unknown. Each photo measures approximately 32.5 in. x 22.5 in.
