The work in most classes from the Freshmen on up was fundamentally discussion work. A few teachers used the Socratic method of teaching. The students asked a question and ended up answering it themselves through the crossexamination of the teacher. The technique brought the students to a better understanding of their religion.

An experimental course in Humanities challenged the top students of each class who excel in English. This subject includes literature, music, painting, sculpture, architecture, and the dance. It approaches the arts through their common principles of subject, function, medium, element, organization, and style.

Movie appreciation provided a new look in the English department, with a film shown and discussed each week. During the year, each Senior English class also wrote, produced, and edited a 15-minute film, which typified the enthusiasm of tomorrow's citizens.

Juniors viewed American and English literature mainly from the aspect of the author's intention. Delving into realism, naturalism, and romanticism, the Sophomores became familiar with Poe, Hemingway, and Steinbeck. The ability to express ideas in writing and in speaking headed the list of requirements for the Freshmen.


Straightening Out Confusing Equations

General Math provided a review of basic principles as well as an introduction to modern mathematics. In Math IV students bound for college became acquainted with higher mathematical formulas.







Just as the United States space program progressed, so did the science department at Lillis.



American Problems students grasped an insight into modern day problems and their possible solutions.



Learning a language isn't easy, but it can be an interesting experience. Two years of French, Spanish, and Latin are offered to Lillis students so they can learn to speak the language fluently.

Sister Carmen taught Spanish with a native accent. Both Spanish and French classes centered around periods spent in the language lab listening to records and tapes. Through the film strip and tape recorder French students listened to and imitated the pronunciation of native speakers to develop the ability to understand and speak French. Sister Elizabeth Ann and Mrs. Verhulst were the French instructors. And Latin scholars became acquainted with Caesar and the glory of Rome under Sister Elizabeth Ann and Sister Bernice.



Communications Create Confidence

Being able to communicate with other people is as important to man as eating. In the Gommunications class, the students learned how the pronunciation of their words could change the meaning of the speeches. Writing their own speeches made them think and record their thoughts more clearly and accurately. Whether demonstrating an object or giving their views on a current topic, the students were taught the fundamentals of speaking to others. Their work also included various choral speaking groups and plays in which they were given the chance to show their abilities to an audience.

Prep-pacers and phrase-flashers helped many students boost their reading speed by several hundred words in the new Speed Reading course. Students learned that pre-reading not only increased speed but raised their comprehension as well. It proved an invaluable asset in all their other classes, especially in taking tests. Students felt that the practice and time involved was worth the effort.



On August 15, Coach Mintner faced one of the most inexperienced teams in the history of Lillis. With only six returning lettermen things looked dim for the team that had just one year before compiled a 10-0 season, being rated number one in the Kansas City area. Nevertheless, this team went into its season with all the determination and spirit that had marked Lillis teams since the beginning of our school.

The first game with William Chrisman looked good until the start of the fourth quarter. They suddenly tied the score 20 all. With only 20 seconds left, the Irish scored, winning the game 27-20. In the next game, East fell 27-6 to the hard running and blocking of the Fighting Irish. Pem Day posed some threat to Lillis's drive for the championship, but they also lost 20-0. against Hogan and at the halftime found themselves the underdogs, 13-14. But the Irish had the will to win and they did 33-14. St. Pius was the next foe to be faced with the hard-hitting Lillis team winning 32-7. Then the Irish came face to face with St. Joseph of Shawnee who was undefeated up to this time. The game was hotly contested, but when the dust settled, the score was Lillis 14, St. Joe 8. With six wins and no losses, the Irish would be hard to stop, and the next two teams failed with St. Mary's falling 39-7 and Blue Springs 46-6. The last game proved too much for the team that had won 8 games straight. The final score was Joplin 27, Lillis 26. Even though the season ended with a loss, the team of '66 compiled a record that will not easily be forgotten.





Irish Finish Season With 17-6 Record Lillis And Pius X Tie For Second Place

From the very first game of the basketball season, it was evident that the Irish were the best. Out of the first 8 games, Lillis won seven, suffering defeat only at the hands of one opponent, Van Horn. When the Catholic League Tourney came around, Lillis was ready and, after defeating Hogan, 76-60, walked off with first place. In the Wm. Chrisman Tournament, Lillis did not do as well, losing to Wm. Chrisman to take second place. One week later the Irish met Hogan on our home court and suffered a setback by losing 97-69. But our spirit was still there as the Irish proceeded to win the next seven games. We wound up the season with a record of 17-7 to make this one of Lillis's best basketball seasons.





Grapplers Grab Second In Catholic Prep




