




The Jacksons opened their tour here in K.C. Three nights, 45,000 people times 3. KC is the place to be.

Cyndi Lauper, although she sings "Money Changes Everything", sure changed the size of her purse because she sold out Kemper too.



John - I didn't like it there because it was boring, very boring, Actually I really wanted to go to New York or Chicago that's were the real fun is at!





There is a time for work and a time for play. All of us have heard that, but this year work and play became one for members of the Chemistry Club.











Lincoln also took time to preregister its students, while most schools just assigned the students through their classes.











Determined Team Comes Out Strong









It is a national program with year end interscholastic competition as well as a yearlong program in creative problem solving and futuristics. The program includes forty-nine states and ten foreign countries.

"We learned a lot about nuclear war, methods of preventing Drunk Driving, and The State of America's Education. Most of all I learned how to work with other people in solving problems. Also it was more serious and more thinking was involved than in a regular classroom," said Jan Lazarczyk, team member. The state program is open to all schools in the state. The program includes a Junior Division, grades 4-6; an Intermediate Division, grades 7-9; and the Senior Division, grades 10-12.

Throughout the year, registered teams composed of four members worked on three practice problems with a sponsoring coach. The problems were evaluated by trained Missouri evaluators. Practice problem number three determines which teams will be invited to the State Bowl in Jefferson City.

Ms. Fellinger's team received an honorable mention on their first practice problem this year.

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






