class of '78 upholds ideals




































vo-tech molds trade skills




























In the referee's position of disadvantage, Norm Witmer deliberates on his next move before the round begins.






Byron Barrett uses the combination of a cross face and leg leverage to obtain a take down.






Jerry Brown strains to keep from being pinned in a cradle hold applied by a South grappler.




Referee Coach Allen carefully assures that all moves are legal as Ron Rorie maneuvers his opponent for a take down.














