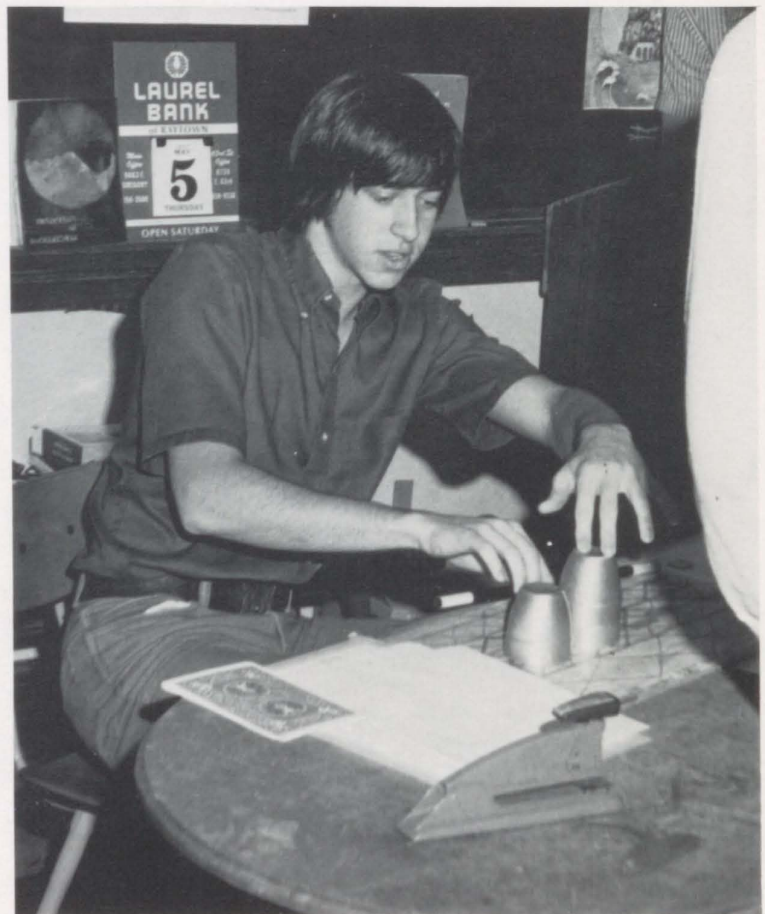
'77 foresees the future

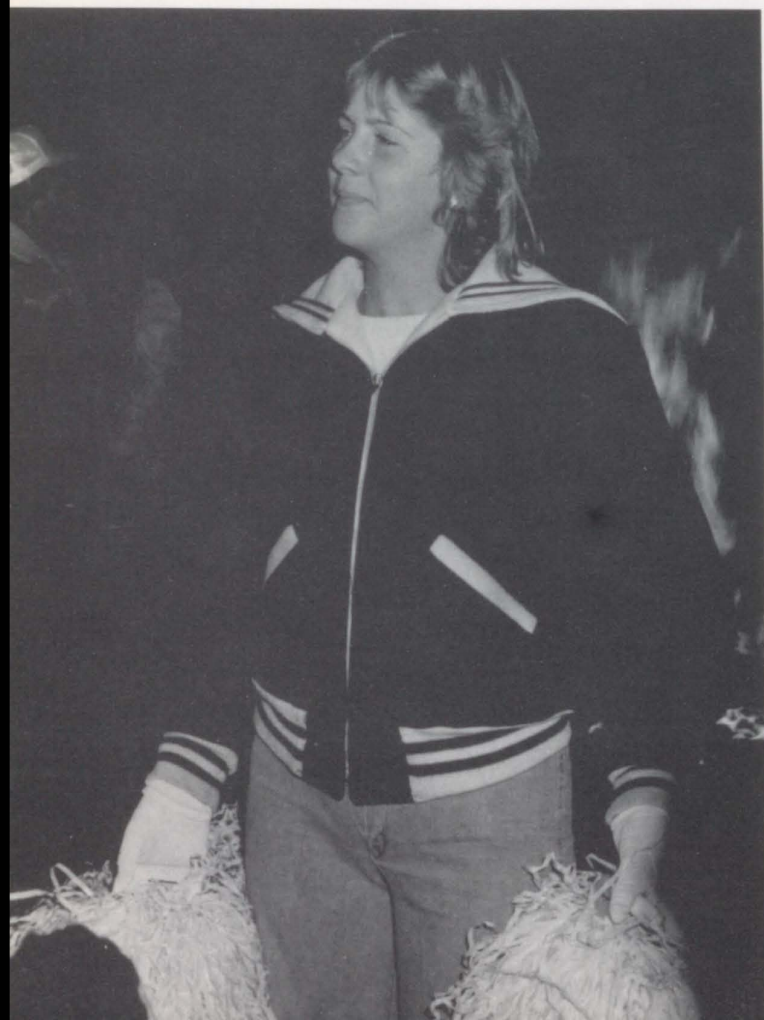

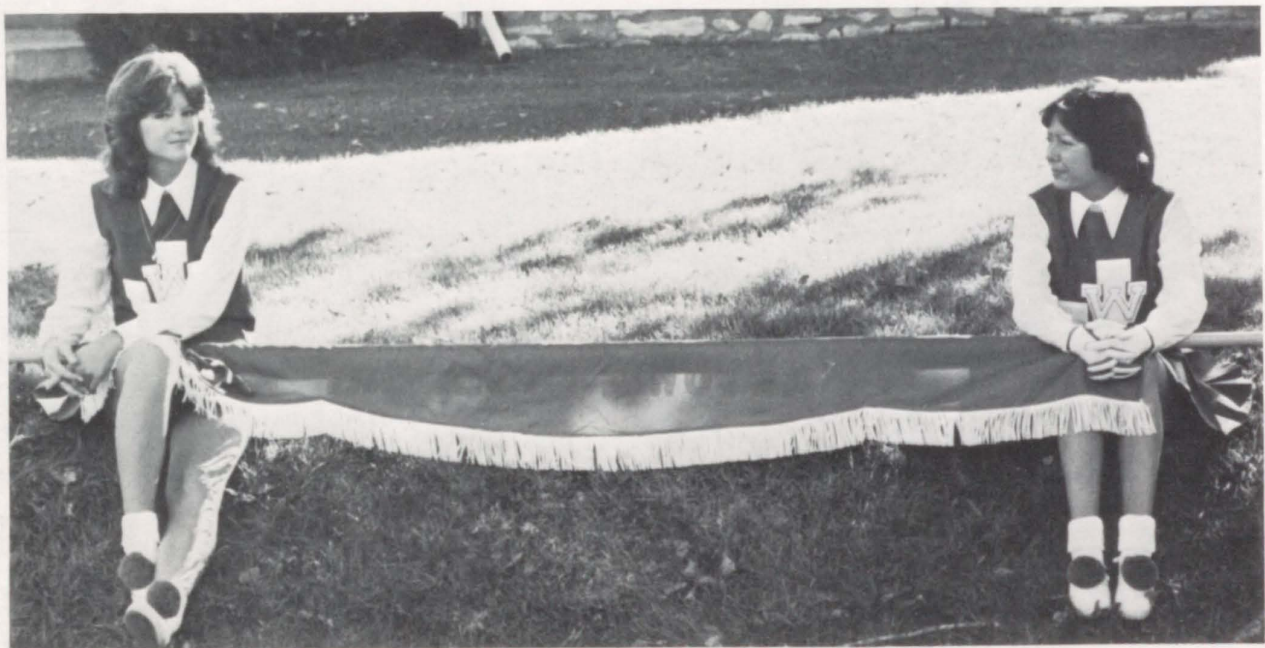

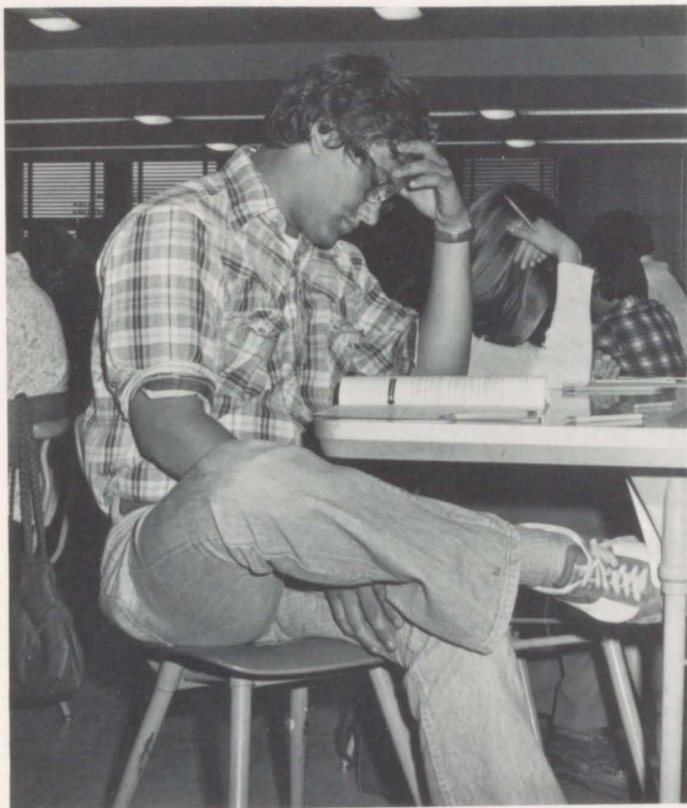

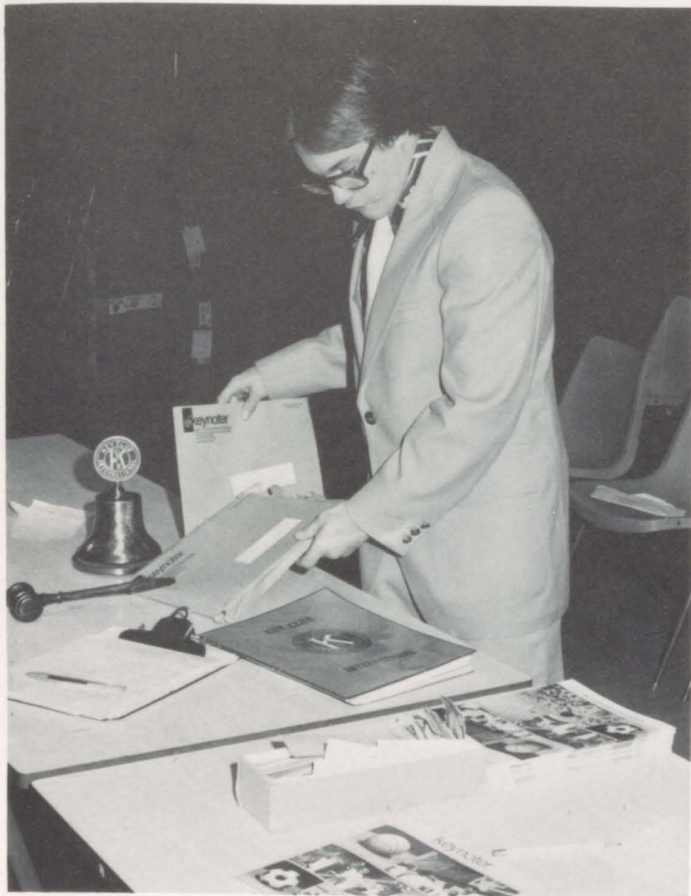

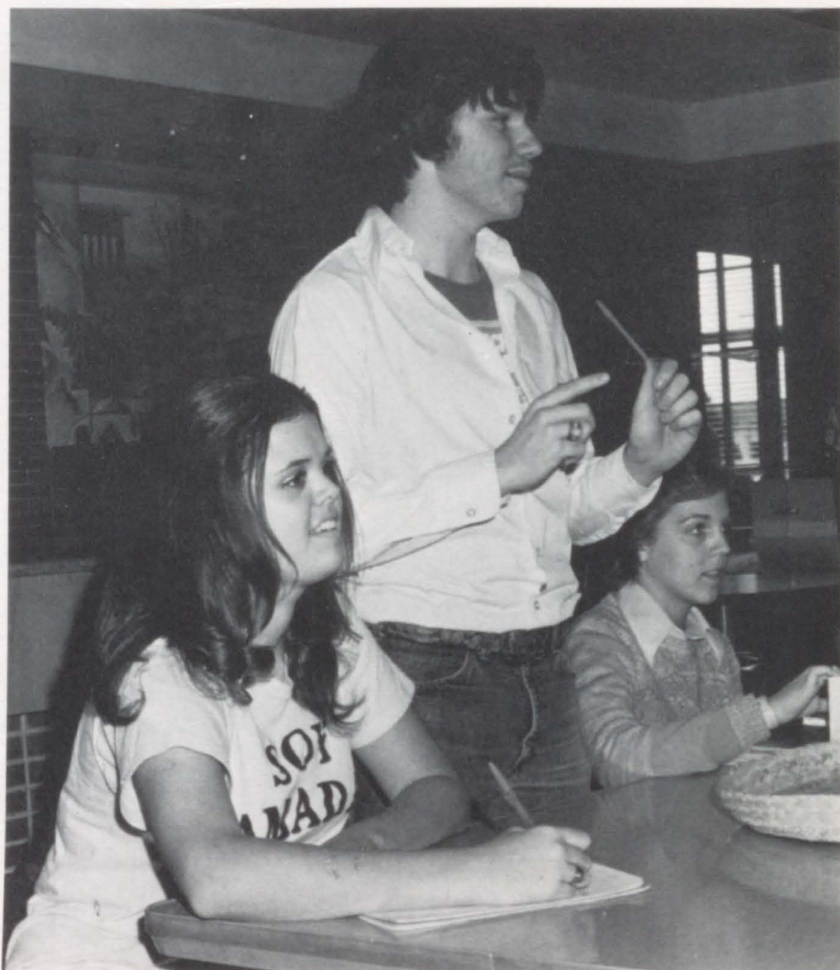

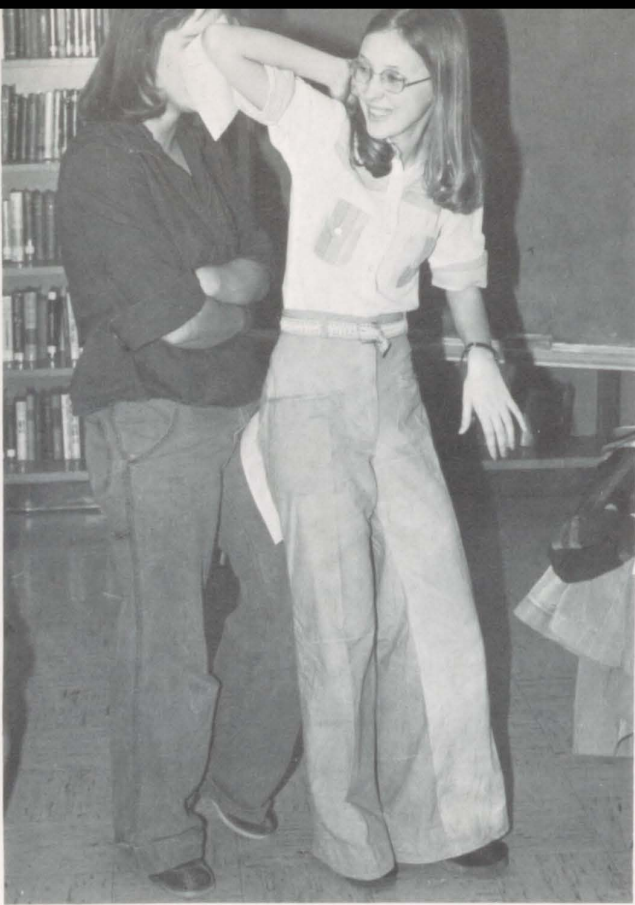

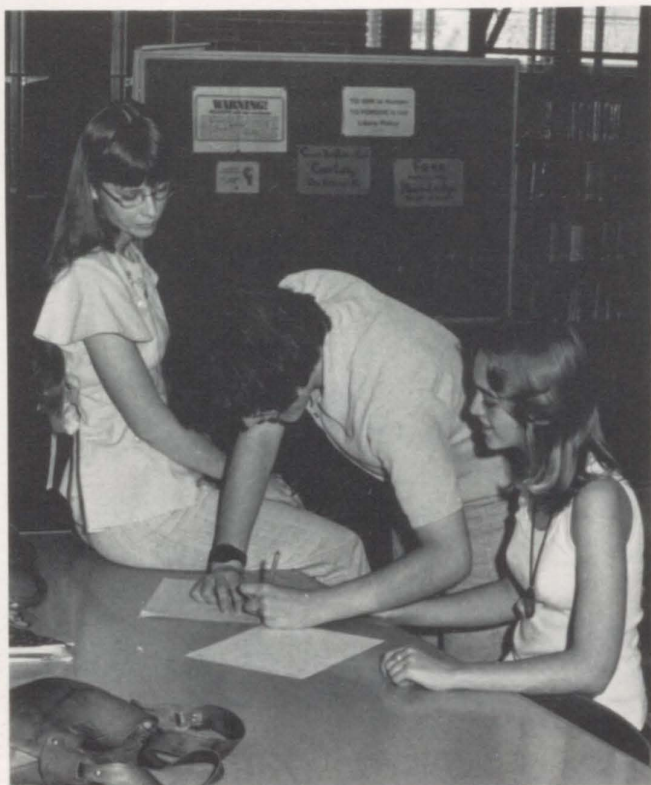

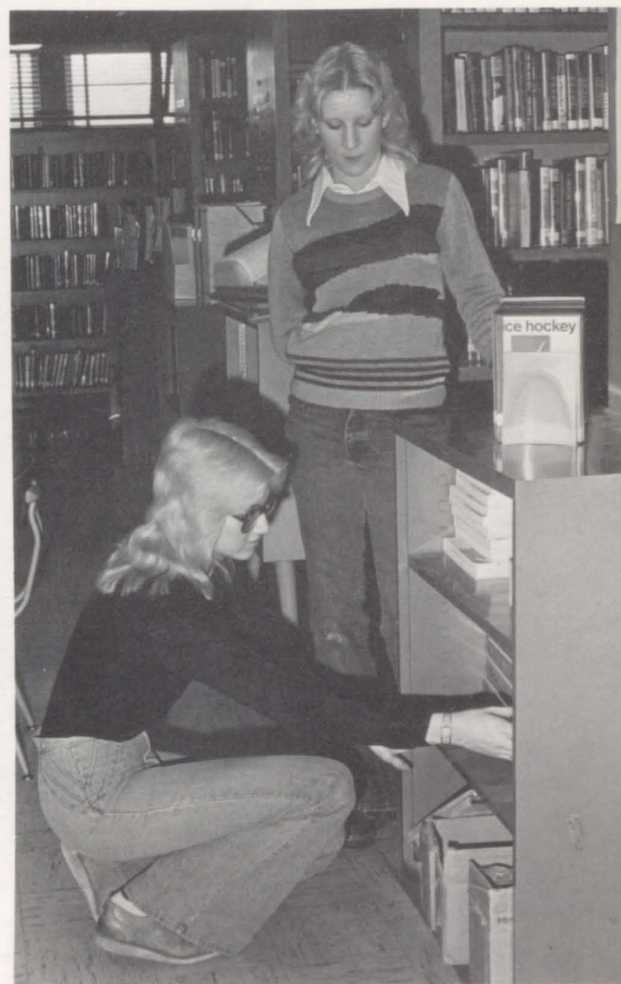

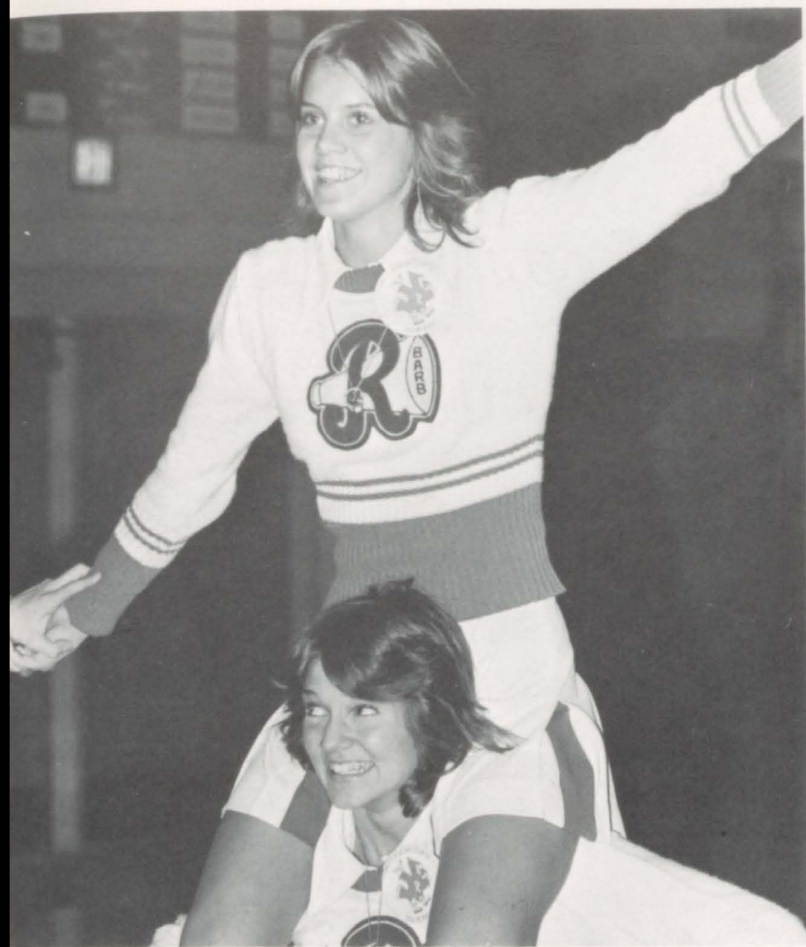
cheerleaders activate teams and pep squad

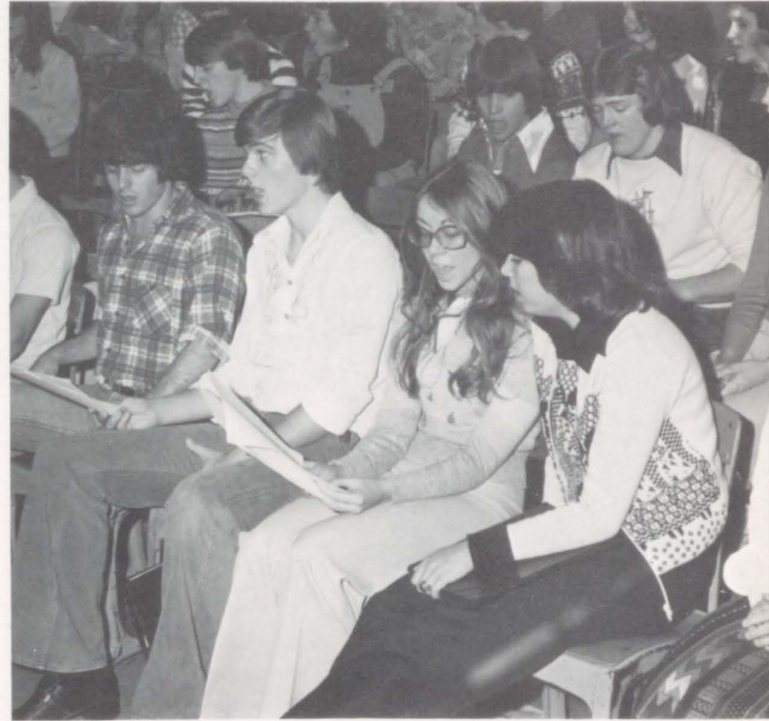

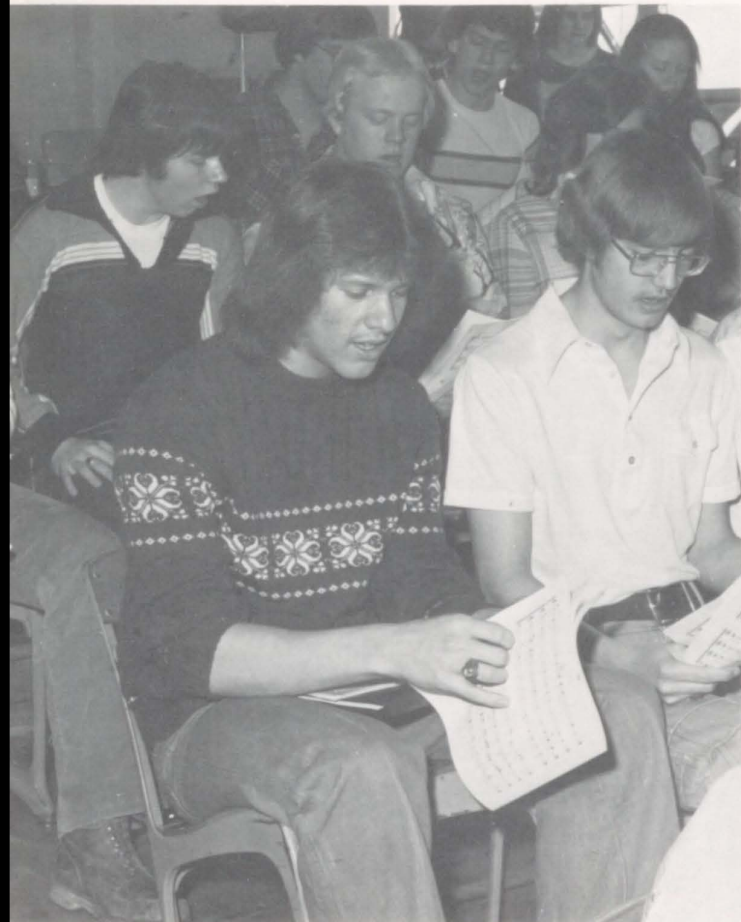

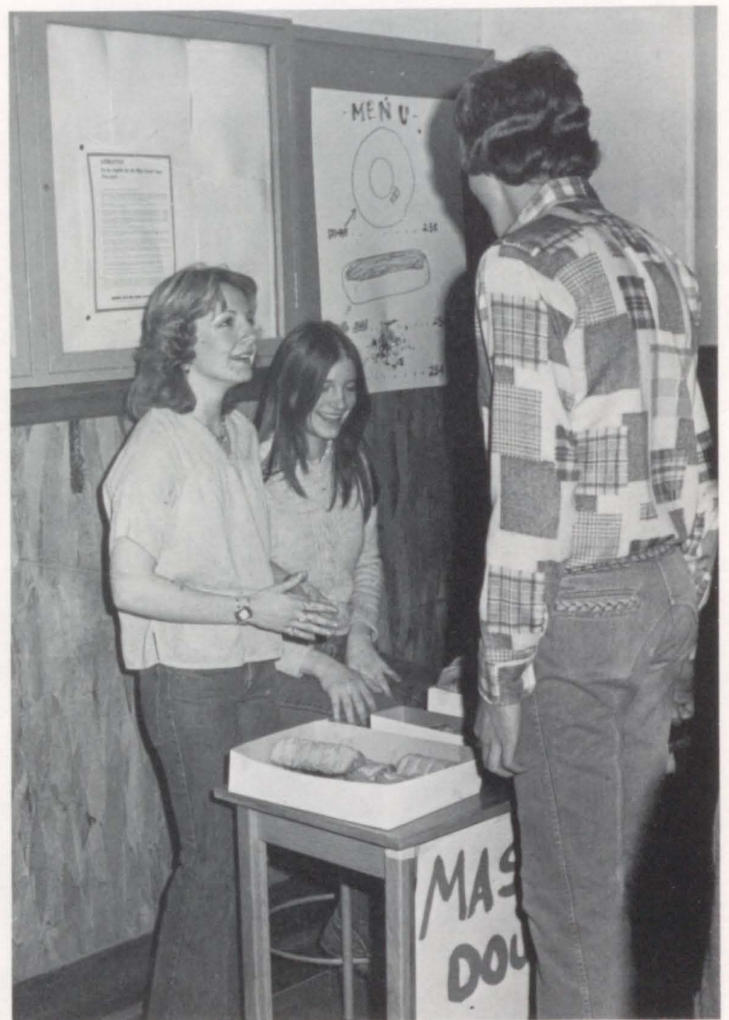

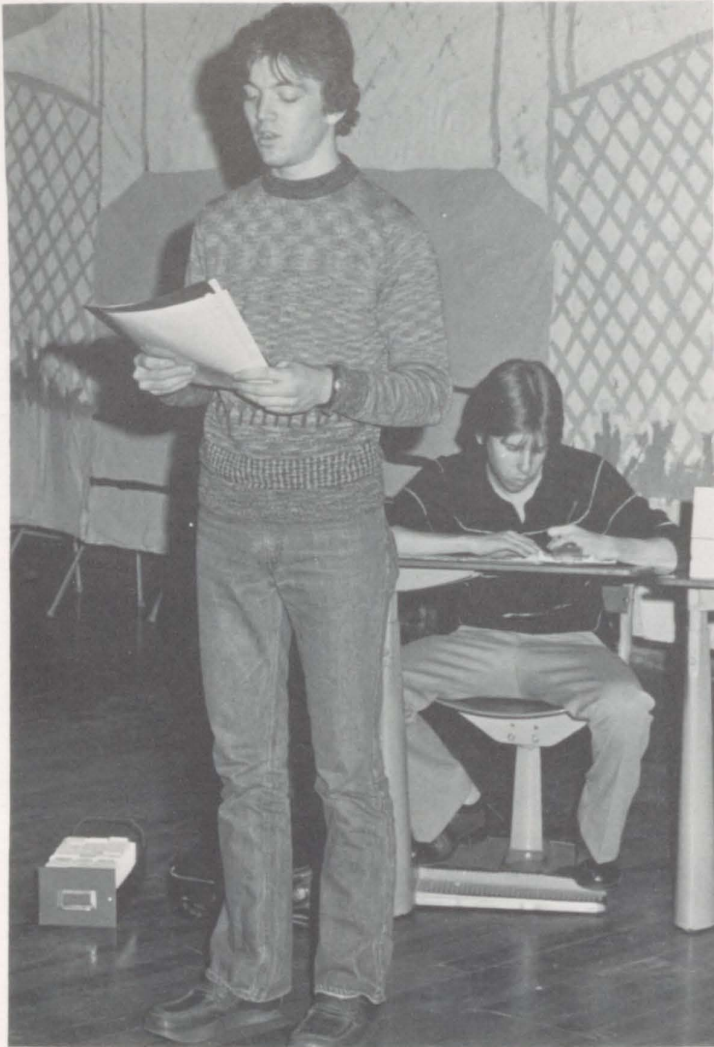

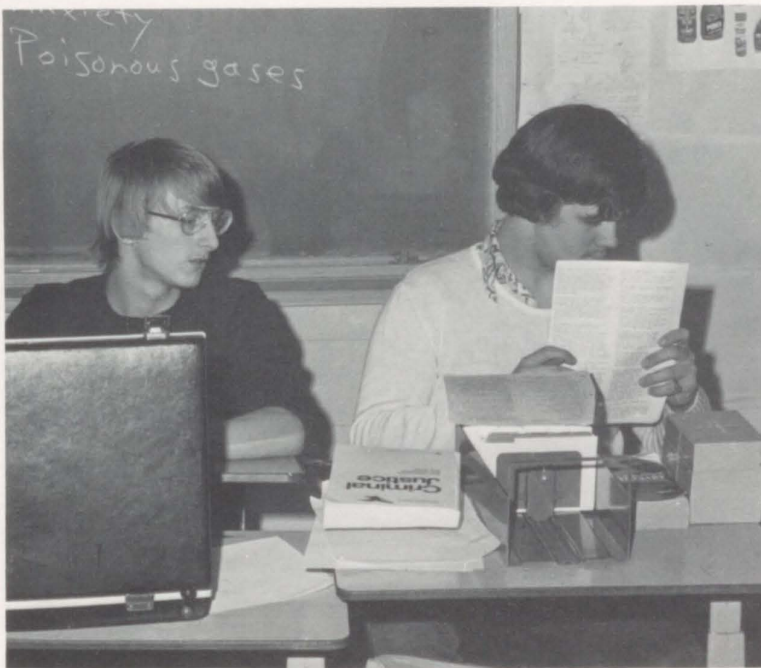

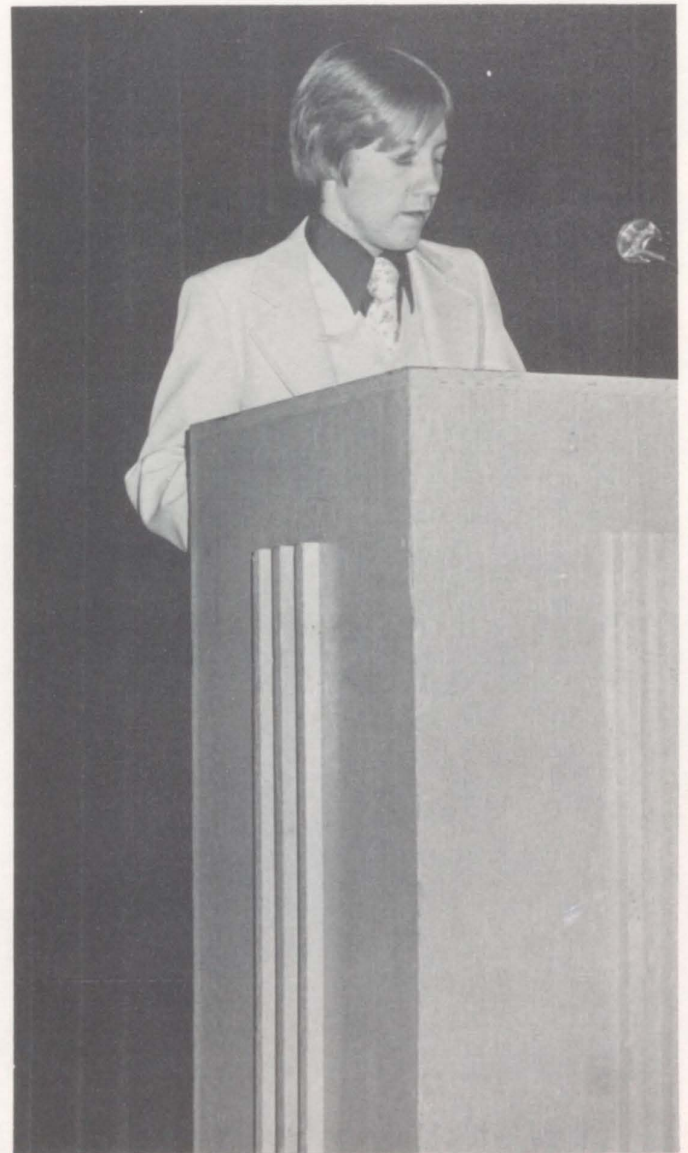

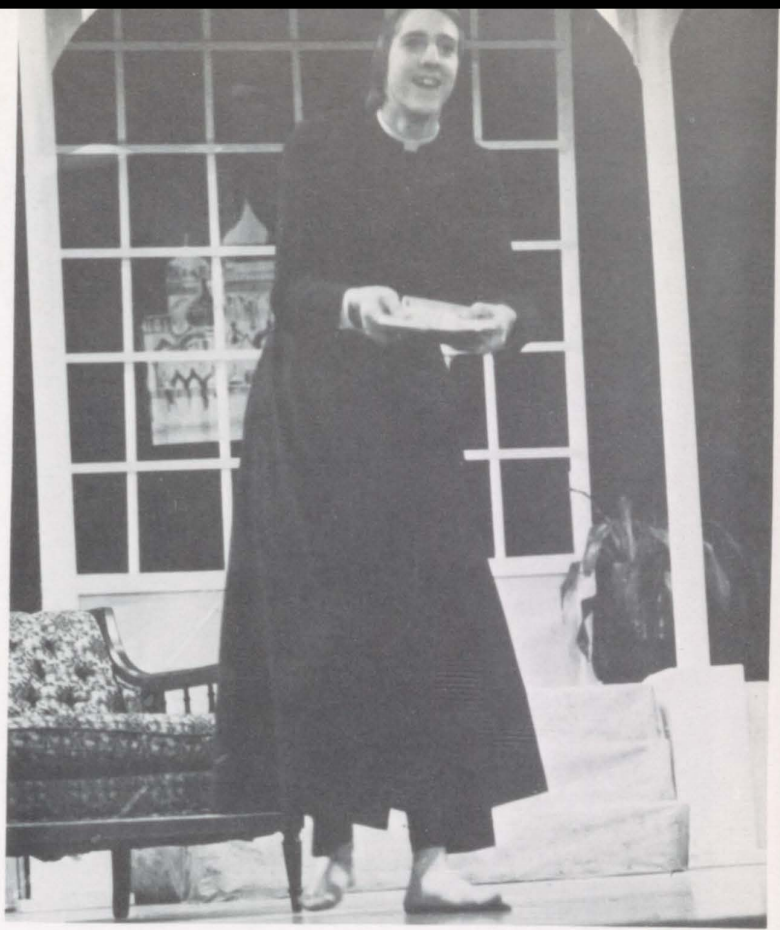

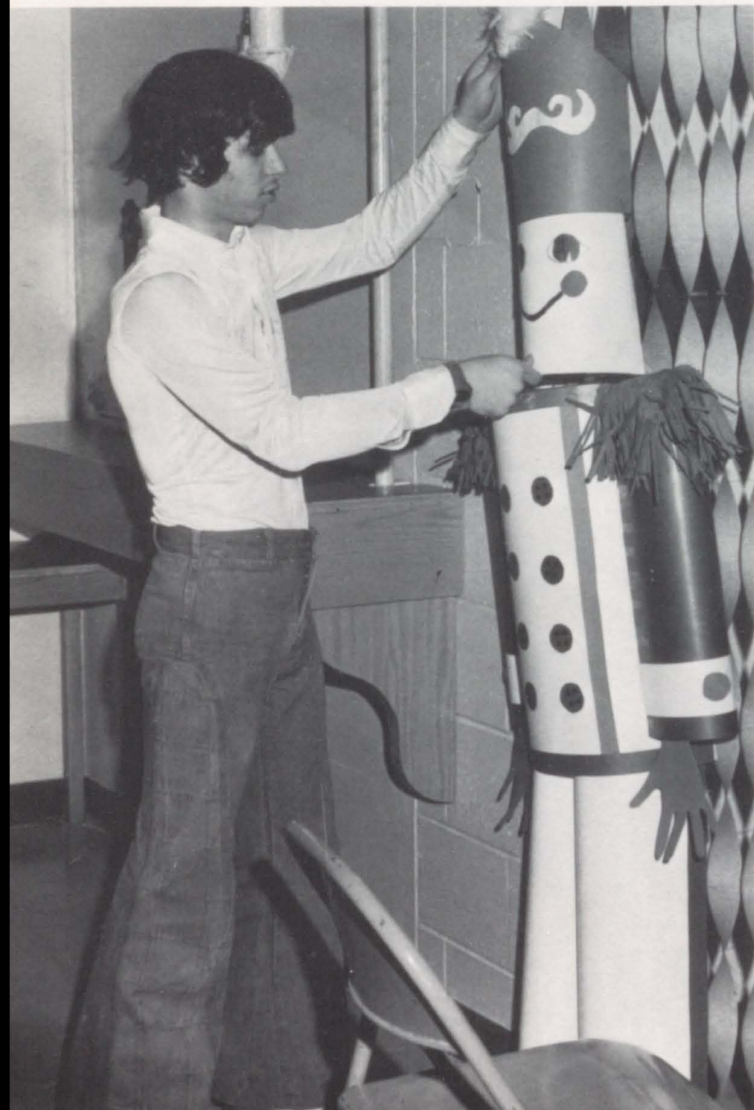

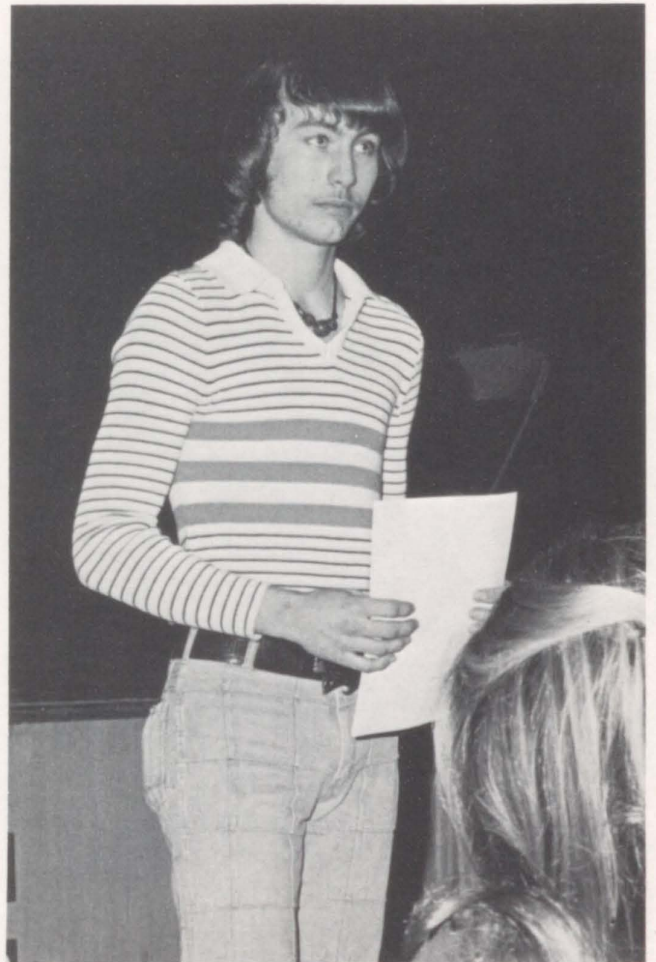

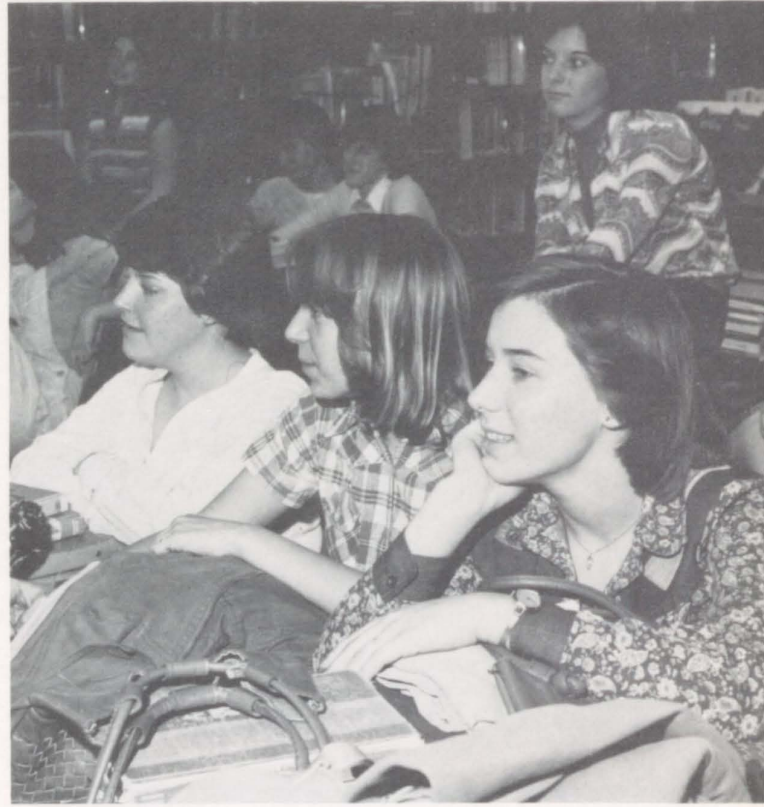

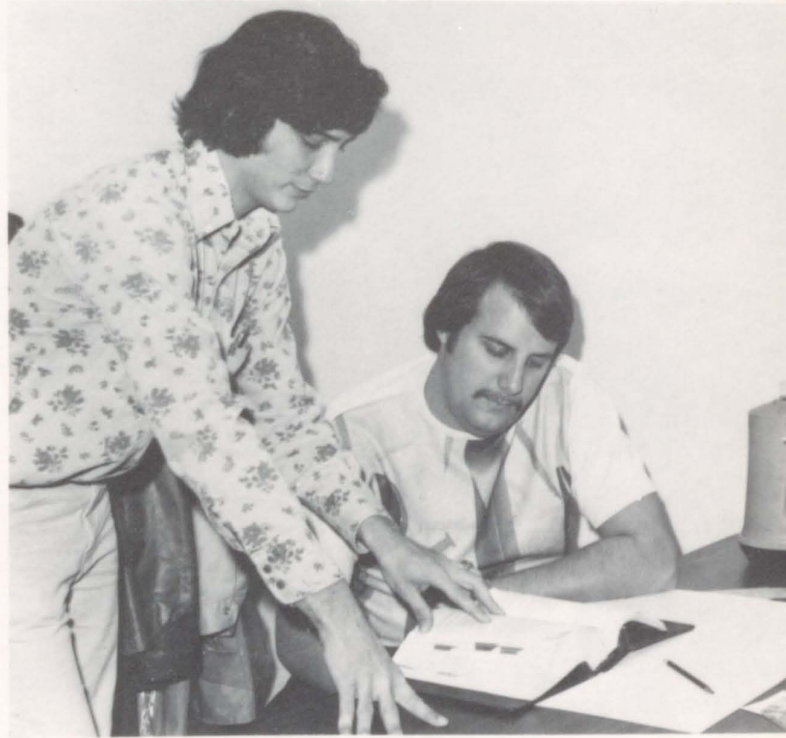
students attain job backgrounds

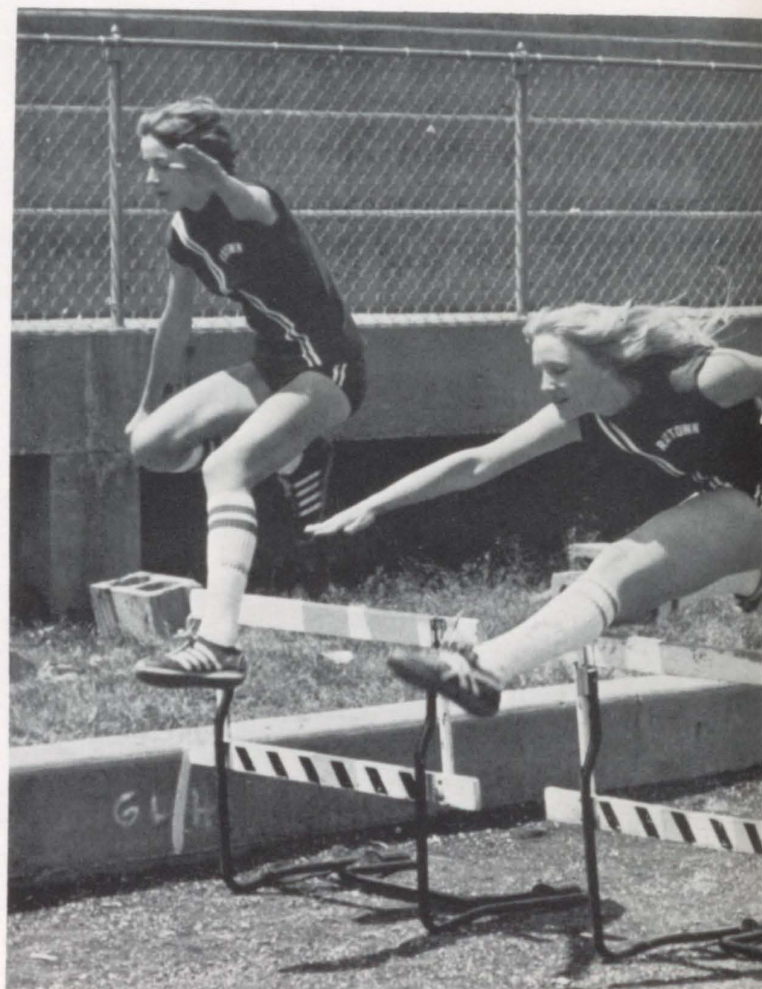

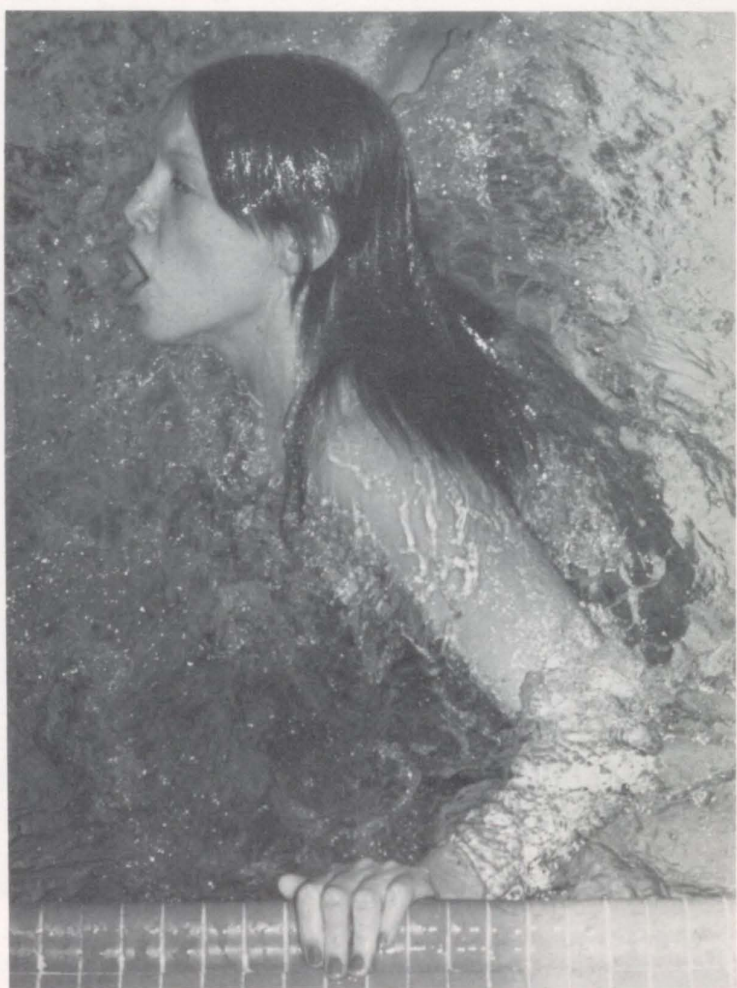
