



The winning name, submitted by Scott Tucker of the St. John LaLande Parish who donated the prize to the teachers of O'Hara and St. Mary's for break room supplies, was announced in August of 2012.

In the years that followed, our parents, educators, architects, designers, and countless others dedicated to the success of St. Michael the Archangel Catholic High School worked to transform the concept into reality. The beauty of our school reflects the sacrifices, determination, and prayers of those who gave opportunity to learn and grow closer to Jesus.




Running, Running, GONE!

Expansion plans include a large outdoor amphitheater adjacent to the existing pond as a venue for larger events as well as outdoor teaching. A portion of the site will be established with native prairie plantings and accessible by a series of nature walks. Plans also include dual-use athletic complex for soccer and football, baseball and softball fields, tennis courts, and a running track.

From the beginning, architectural plans included professional interior designers who painstakingly selected furniture, lighting, colors, flexible work spaces, carpeting, paint, bulletin boards, whiteboard design, cabinets, and much more. The interior designers converted our school building into a beautiful, comfortable learning environment.

Continuing The Legacy Catholic Education



Each of these schools represent a community of students, parents, teachers, and many more who supported and cared deeply for these institutions. Memorabilia proudly displayed throughout the halls of St. Michael the Archangel Catholic High School serves to remind us of our heritage, we are honored to carry the flame of Catholic education into the future.

Archbishop O'Hara 1965 - 2017

Archbishop O'Hara High School, a Catholic La Sallian college preparatory school, closed its doors in May of 2017. Jennifer Mowen (Rowland) enjoys sharing her memories of O'Hara and the teachers that impacted her life. She recalls, "When I started at O'Hara, Mr. Jed, the biology teacher would run down the hallways with his cape yelling "Captain biology! It was common for him to do this on test days." She also shared that a one point he was promoted in rank when some students made him a cape proclaiming him "Major Biology".

In addition to a rich curriculum, athletics added to Celtic pride. Under the leadership of Coach Paul Monteil, Jr, the football team won the 1980 state championship. In honor of Coach Monteil, the O'Hara football stadium was name "Paul Monteil Stadium" in 2001. Mrs. Mowen recalls him as more than a coach and history teacher, "He was a friend to the students and was someone anyone could go to, especially during the hard times." She also shared that he was her favorite and attributes him with getting her and her friends through their sophomore year. Through her smile and words, Mrs. Mowen's alumni pride is evident.

Celtic pride remains in the hearts of those who walked the hallways, played in the gym, prayed in the chapel, learned in the classrooms, and lived their lives within the Catholic community.







St. Mary's 1853 - 2013

Mary's High School provided quality Catholic education for more than 160 years. Prior to closing, it was the oldest operating school west of the Mississippi River. Despite declining enrollment, the decision to close the school came as a surprise to many parents and students. With a total enrollment of only 102 students, the last class of 27 seniors graduated in May of 2013. A parent of two St. Mary graduates and an alumni herself recalled that although th declining enrollment could no longer support the financial obligations, it was still a shock to realize her youngest child would never attend their family alma mater.

Our very own Mrs. Espinosa was quoted in May of 2013 by Fox 4 News regarding the closing, "It's a little surreal and it's very sad; it's a big ending of my life here." She worked at St. Mary's for 22 years, met her husband there, and her three children went to school there.

Keep your eyes open and you may just see a "Forever A Trojan" t-shirt in the SMA stands!

De La Salle 1910 - 1971

Although the school doors closed for the last time 47 years ago, Mr. John Delgado recalls his alma mater almost as if he graduated last May.

Opened as a Catholic school for boys, it later added the discipline of military preparatory curriculum during World War II, which continued until the early 1960s. The deeply rooted values formed a strict yet loving disciplined environment led by the Christian Brothers who strived to turn unruly young students into men of Christ.

The brothers helped the students to grow in maturity and to face the future with hope and courage. De La Salle traditions included football games against the rival Rockhurst and for the "Little Brown Jug" played every year except during WWII. School days were similar to our school days, with students starting off the day in prayer and attending all seven classes. Long lunch breaks each day allowed for intramural competitions and extracurricular activities. Each Friday, the young men attended all school Mass.



First Days First Day Jitters

As soon the obnoxious alarm sounded and the realization of the first day of school came to mind, anticipation swelled and questions multiplied! What would the first days of a new school be like? How will I know where my classes are? Will I like it? First day jitters are one thing, but the thrills and fears of a first day at a brand new school takes it to a whole new level.

Turning into the driveway, heading up the hill, and following the curve of the road, our beautiful new high school building comes



into view. But no one expected the lively welcome! The greeting for each "first day" included music that shook the air, a giant green and navy archway, and the entire staff cheering as students entered.

On the first day, seniors crowded together in the parking lot leery of approaching the odd scene. One student recalled, "I didn't know what was happening! We were hanging out in the parking lot and then a nun came out into the parking lot and walked us through the crowd!" Although the student asked to remain anonymous, she said that she now knows that it was Sr. Mirium that escorted the group into the school. Each "first" day mirrored the previous day with the upperclassmen joining in the fun as cautious juniors, sophomores, and freshman paced along the walkway while scanning the crowd for familiar faces. Eventually, each student bravely faced the music, entered the archway, and received high-fives the welcoming students and staff.

In addition to the morning welcoming, transfer students and freshmen were welcomed into one of our three communities through a special confetti ceremony. Daily mass and community time during the first week of school helped students to feel at home as they met their house captains, house mentor, and fellow house members.

Thank you to the SMA staff for making our fist days fun and memorable!



Language Arts, taught by Ms. Lohman, Mr. Moreno, and Sister Mary Andre, provides students with the opportunity to learn about new worlds, different time periods, and historical ideas through reading a variety of novels. Writing stories and essays serves to enhance student writing, organization, grammar, and word selection skills. Although students may struggle with writing lengthy essays or scouring American literary classics, students' express gratitude for the teachers who prepare them for the AP exams, college, and life. Ms. Lohman, who has been teaching English for six years in public schools, feels blessed to be able to continue her story in such a positive environment. With a big smile, she describes the students as making "teaching enjoyable and fun," while advising students to refrain from "mixing up their, there, and they're." 


The Work of His Hands

Our dedicated teachers enrich students' understanding of math and science. Through a variety of courses, students apply principles learned in the classroom to everyday issues.

Although some things just don't add up no matter what you try, math teachers hold the key to evey math problem. The dedication of our teachers is immeasurable. Mr. Kirmer shared his thoughts regarding teaching, "My favorite part of teaching is being able to see students growing everyday. You don't always get the light bulb moment, but when it clicks, it is a pretty cool thing."

Hand-n-Hand St. Michael Inclusive Learning Enhancement

Our unique SMILE program provides students with differentiated learning opportunities. The fun environment reinforces concepts introduced in the classroom and provides real world experiences. For example, SMILE students learn to drive by driving a golf cart around the school property and learn to care for animals by caring for our dog, Mike, which helps students relax and to form loving bonds. In fact, our SMILE students run their own business, known as Guardian Grinds! Students apply and refine vocational skills such as interacting with customers, preparing coffee and smoothies, taking orders, calculating sales, and counting back change.

The SMILE program and Peer Mentoring program work handin-hand. Peer mentors work directly with SMILE students to provide social and academic support under the guidances of well trained teachers. In talking with several Peer Mentor students about why they chose to devote themselves to this program, several of them said that it began as a way to develop leadership skills and to find out if being a teacher might be a future path but each mentor said that they received so much more than what they gave. Senior peer mentor Ellie Edmundson sums up her experience, "The SMILE program means so much to me. It is so unique that I get the opportunity to be apart of these amazing kids' lives. These kids have changed my life. Their positive outlook on life is so inspiring not only to me but the rest of their peers. "


Madame Evans






Father Sly's Thoughts



Shaping Our World 2017-2018

As school days fade one into the other and as today's news becomes tomorrow's history, memories fade. As the months and years pass, each of us will glance through the pages of this yearbook to recall a person, face, or event. Most of the pages contained herein reflect a devotion to our Catholic school community. However, the events around the world, within our nation, and even just down the street also impacted our lives. Here are just a few of the most memorable stories . . .

Weather or Not

While Californians often feel the earth move, the risk of a significant earthquake escalated as Mexico experienced several earthquakes with the most significant ranging between a magnitude of 8.1 and 6.2, injuring thousands and toppling buildings between September of 2017 and February of 2018 (CNN, 18 Feb. 18). Mother Nature also showed her strength when several hurricanes attacked the U. S. coastline and devastated Puerto Rico. Category 4 Hurricane Harvey swept over Houston, displacing entire families and causing almost more than an estimated \$75 billion in damages. An unlucky Puerto Rico took a double hit from Hurricane Irma and then Hurricane Maria. A large percentage of the island was without power, with some areas remaining without electricity for more than six months. While debates regarding the existence of Global Warming, 2017 included a 1 trillion iceberg (about 2,200 across) breaking free from the Arctic ice shelf resulting in the cooling of ocean water (USA Today, Jul. 2017). Weather you believe in global warming or not, that is one big ice cube!

Going Nuclear

Openly testing nuclear weapons, North Korea demanded our attention. Sending a warhead flying into the sky in November that remained airborne for almost an hour before plunging into the Sea of Japan, tested the U. S. tolerances for the display of power. Subsequently, several world leaders attempt to reach a diplomatic agreement with the North Korean leaders. The Soviet Union responded with their own display of nuclear power by releasing a video of Russian technological advances in nuclear weaponry. Maybe we better get out our history books for a refresher on the Cold War!

A Total Eclipse

With Missouri in the path of totality, students headed outside on August 21, 2017, to see it with their own eyes with special glasses of course. It had been almost forty years (2/26/79) since the last total solar eclipse. SMA students watch from the parking lot while enjoying an ice cream treat.

Under the Ice

While plenty of metals were earned at the 2018 Winter Olympics in Pyeongchang, South Korea, the hottest topics had nothing to do with snow or ice. Having been sanctioned for using performance enhancing drugs (doping), Russian athletes opted to compete as an independent entry known as the Olympic Athletes of Russian with a newly designed flag. Even under sanctions it was reported that two Russian athletes tested positive for banned substances. Both North and South Korea also made history when athletes from both countries competed brought home 23 medals with 9 being gold medals.

Parkland - Sandy Hook -

What do each of these cities have in common? Tragedy.

In 2018, Parkland, Florida gain national attention as videos of students at Stoneman Douglas High School being gunned down in classrooms and hallways. Amid the political debates surrounding Constitutional Second Amendment, the surviving students, school staff, and parents channeled their grief into activism. Hashtags such as "#NeverAgain" and "#MarchForOurLives" flooded Twitter. Students also organized rallies, marches, and headed to Washington D.C. for conversations with our political leaders, including the President. Although a resolution to the gun violence in our school still eludes our leaders, the students will never give up the fight and right to feel safe at school.

A True Marvel

As one of the most anticipated films of the year, blockbuster Black Panther hit movie screens in March of 2018, breaking box-office records. Opening weekend brought in more than \$192 million, establishing Black Panther as the fifth largest movie opening ever. Spending four weeks a number one, the movie is now the number one grossing Marvel film and the number one grossing film in the U.S.A. Featuring a culturally diverse production team and cast, the actors, royal storyline, and visual effects all received critical acclaim. (Fandango, Mar. 2018)

Stephen Hawking passed away leaving the world with a multitude of scientific work and a series of children's books featuring cosmic travels based upon scientific theory. Snowflake Dance





A Slam DUNK Junior Varsity & Freshman Basketball






Reaching High Girl's Basketball






Block Busters Varsity Volleyball

And who knows? Maybe we will see these players on the varsity team one day!








A Work of Heart Fine Arts Gala






One Track Mind Track & Field


