
Apostolic Youth Corps Shares Jesus with the Unfortunate


The school paper is a big production. This year it has become even a bigger task because there is a limit not in talent but in the number of staff members.


Students Past and Present Honor Their Patron







Teachers put a lot of time into planning courses where they had particular interest or talent. (This is mini copy for the mini courses which were planned for a mini-week.)








On Their Honor






A Real Heart-to-Heart Thing














Comidas and Boissons








A Night Out

Mr. Nixon and Spiro T. were guest speakers for the spirit assembly impersonated by Beth Bowen and Lori Burns, respectively.






All year long there are girls working ardently in the Art Room. However, it is not until the spring projects appear in the front halls of M & A that fellow classmates realize that there are artists among them.












