












Shooting Stars are created through school










Radiating Gold






As we thundered down the halls and fretted about homework, we began to lose sight of the motivation behind each action. Science. Science is involved in every move we make and every step we take.

The science teachers this year were: Ms. Trisha Smith, Ms. Renee Blake, Sr. Harriet Koutsoumpas, and Thompson.








So history classes weren't just taken to fulfill graduation requirements; in many cases they helped students to explore the past in new and exciting ways.


















Teachers Enjoying Their Subjects, Job


Have you ever wondered why your teachers teach? Our foreign language and religion teachers enjoyed being in the classroom each day and some of them commented on why they chose this career.


Mr. Firth commented, "I love influencing young minds and teaching the girls how to become better Christians."



















Musical Groups Hit High Note


Music classes "helped me learn new songs," said **Maria Valenti**, senior. "They opened my eyes to different types of music."

Dedication is also what brings performers and performances together. **Katie Bonderer**, sophomore, said that the music classes were "fun and interesting, because when we sang we felt close."









This proved to be true as the team finished with a win against Sion and other rivals. The team also received first place in Districts.



"It may not have shown in our record, but we worked really hard and never gave up, no matter who our opponent was," said J.V. player **Annie Braun**.





STA faces tough year in soccer


St. Teresa's Academy had a very challenging year on the soccer field.





SCO Important to Our School





NHS Strives for the Best





French and Spanish Clubs Are More Than Just Speaking


The French and Spanish Club is offered to STA students interested in learning more about the language they are taking. It gives them a chance to explore their language in a different way than the normal classroom foremat.


Computer, Science Clubs achieve goals


The Characters of Ladies and Literature



What exactly is the CARE Club? Well, it isn't just about helping freshmen adjust to St. Teresa's Academy. It is about much more.




The CARE Club's moderator was **Mr. Egner**. He had many positive words about the club. "I think it's great how they make the freshmen feel at home in the STA community."


When asked why she thought PRIDE would make a difference at STA, **Megan Roy**, senior, said that "Even though we all look different and act different, we are all a lot alike."

Clubs That Care


The Community Service Club and Students Against Drunk Driving were two important clubs. They were both dedicated to making this world a better and safer place.

Secretary: **Monica Steed**: and Treasurer: **Sharon Huppe**.






Amnesty and Drama Club were two clubs that were organized and worked hard. They were an important part of STA and deserve to be recognized as excellent clubs.

No matter where we were or who we were with, we were given advice. Sometimes it was from our parents, who told us how to act, and sometimes advice from friends, who told us which clothes were "in."


Ninth-grader **Chrissy Herbic** said the best advice she's gotten has been to "listen to your parents; they know more than you because they have been there."

CEREMONY IS IMPORTANT PART OF JUNIOR YEAR


