a time to keep, and a time to cast away.




Even on the weekend it's hard to relax. There are always decisions to be made. There never seems to be enough time for everything that needs to get done.

jammed till 10:30, when the Teresian court was announced. After the coronation, the dance floor was once again a sea of twisting, turning, and spinning bodies.


As the night progressed, couples gathered their shoes, cameras, coats, and purses,

The week was kicked off after a three-day weekend. Tuesday everyone pulled out their tye-dyes and bell-bottoms for Hippie Day.


Lunch Tuesday was festive with sixties music and a limbo contest. Wednesday was so cozy; everyone got to wear their pajamas to school!!

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



### Thought-Provoking Theater

Those who missed last year's spring play may still be unsure of what they missed. Despite popular belief, the drama

department's spring production, *Kindertransport*, was not based on school buses or pre-school carpools. The story was based on events that occurred in Nazi Germany during World War II.

The Kindertransport was a system developed by Germans to help Jewish children escape to Britain, America, and Paraguay, after Hitler came to power. The Kindertransport was able to manipulate the virtually closed railway system by using false pretenses for the children's trips and providing the children with passports.

Started by the "Movement for the Care of Children from Germany," the Kindertransport was able to move nearly 10,000 children out of Germany before being closed down at the start of the war with Britain.

Last year's play, by Diane Samuels, tells the story of one girl who escaped Germany by the Kindertransport. While the character of Eva/Evelyn is not based on one specific person, it tells the story of many.

Following on the heels of such

I have finally come to the realization that the "perfect movie date" will remain in the movies. But I still say don't lose hope, that perfect date just might happen...in your dreams.




















Unlike other departments at STA, the Development and Marketing Offices don't assign homework. Their respective goals are to raise funds for STA and attract prospective students to the school.













Freshman Reilly Smith said, "It was more fun than I


thought it would be."






What comes to your mind when






metropolitan community by serving as critics of young adult books for the Kansas City Public Libraries.



Similarly, the Spanish club, led by Mr. Erick Chaverri, was more active.






freshmen in the FRO club really enjoyed their new experience of getting to know one another.



Students also gained responsibility by adopting a computer and taking care of it the whole year.


By the knowledge acquired from participating in the Science Club and Computer Club, students are definitely preparing for the challenges that await them.

In their fight for human rights, there is still much work to be done, but the Amnesty


members continue to fight against the injustices that many people are subjected to, because of their beliefs.







believed in."



School may always be school; but at least at STA, teachers plan fun and interesting topics or activities so that the students can enjoy themselves while learning and get away from the seriousness of that textbook.

























Although teachers are great advice-givers, and good friends, there is a time to work. You may not think that being a teacher is all that hard, but it is.

The projects are also a benefit for the students. Students


are not stuck in the classroom listening to lectures and taking notes. It gives them the real-life use of things they learn in the classroom.


























### Entering the Teresian Zone



Some may not notice the difference between freshmen and sophomores, but to others, the change is considered drastic. Sophomores can't even believe they were once freshmen.





**Moore** said, "Being a class officer was a really good experience. Junior year was a fun yet busy year, and we felt that we were very successful in our accomplishments."







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
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### Letters and thanks from the Editors
