






"Music Man" Is WHS All-School Musical








Sweetheart King









Academics


The counselors are the people with all the answers. If you want to know about colleges, vocational schools, summer jobs, or the draft, the counselors are the people to talk to.


The counselors are always glad to see students, when they have the time. Appointments are almost a necessity.



Everything from typing to bookkeeping to shorthand to business law is offered by the faculty of the business department.


Off in a wing of its own, this department is often forgotten in the hustle and bustle of everyday life, but many students would be lost without it.





So goes the Winnetonka Social sciences department. Seriously, though, the social sciences department has a major impact upon the student body at Big "W".


There are a great majority of students enrolled in social sciences department. True, a lot of the courses are required, but still many students are studying them.






Mathematics at Winnetonka took a modernistic twist this past year. The math department had the opportunity to "test drive" some digital computers.






A sound mind is not much without a healthy body to support it. The teachers in the physical education department made it their business to insure that every student enrolled in their courses met the criteria of having a healthy body.





Cross Country

The Winnetonka cross country squad got off to a slow start in the 1973 season. The Griffins dropped their first meet with Raytown South and William Chrisman finishing third in a field of three. Having discovered what it was like to lose the harriers bounced back with two clear victories. Then came a series of good performances: seventh in a field of fifteen at the Raytown South Invitational; first over Belton, Center and Raytown; second at the Northland Invitational; and sixth at the Ruskin Invitational.

Big "W" finished third in conference behind Raytown South and Oak Park. Then, at the district meet, the Griffins finished only fourth, behind Fort Osage, Oak Park, and William Chrisman. Here the road ended for Winnetonka as a team. Only senior Rick Balagna qualified for the regional meet, where he continued on to state. Balagna also set a new school record of 10:01.



And so it was with eager anticipation that the Winnetonka football squad sallied forth against their first foe, the Park Hill Trojans.






"Winnebago" Shuts Out Park Hill 19-0







Unfortunately Winnetonka did not prove to be the team to beat Oak Park. In a game scarred by fumbles, the Griffins lost 33-7. That the game that was.







Winnetonka Takes Two


It takes determination to continue when all seems hopeless. The Griffin roundballers must have used three or four times their quota of "what it takes" this year, but they kept right on fighting.






WHS Ties NKC In Knots





























Track Field 1973






WHS Golf 1973

(Clockwise from top) Coach Jim Shepherd offers advice to prospective golfers. Bob Orr demonstrates "how it's done". Concentration is the key.










Tennis Squad 4th


Griffins Take First


