Service to district goal of board

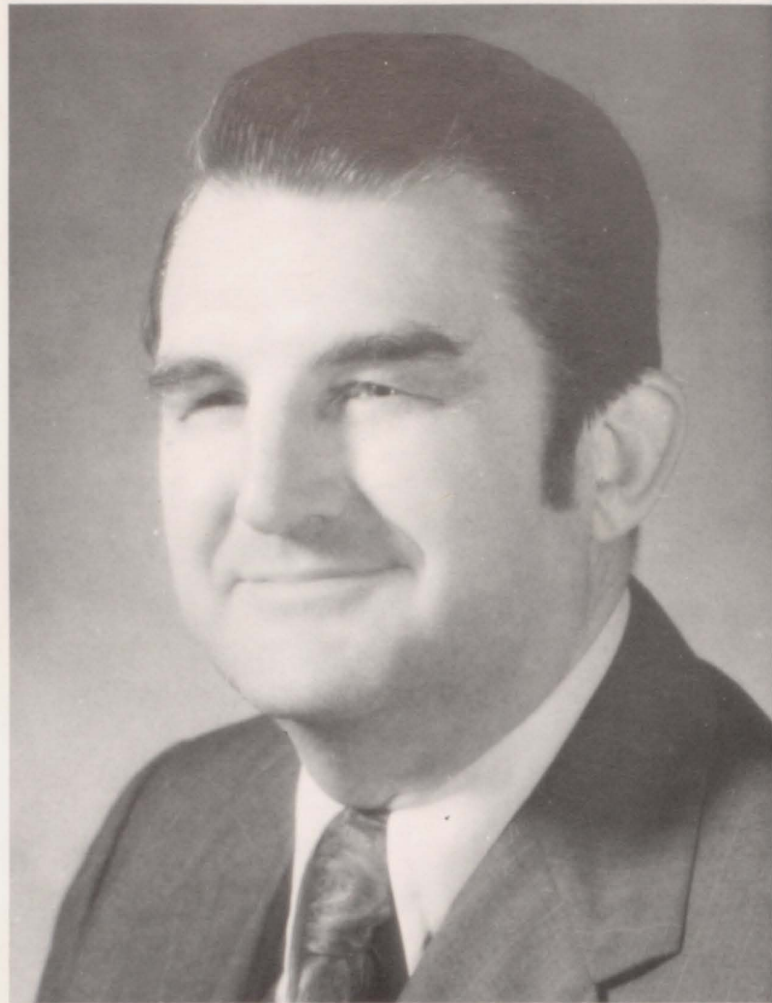
At the end of the 1974-75 school year Dr. R. B. Doolin finished his twentieth year of service as Superintendent of the Public Schools of the North Kansas City School District.

The Board developed legislative policies for the District and approved budgets for the schools.

On April 1 voters in the District elected Frances V. Foerschler and Bob R. Raines to serve three-year terms on the Board. On April 3 the election results were certified and the Board organized for the new year. Officers elected for the new year were Doris S. Benefiel as President and Frances V. Foerschler as Vice President.

During the year the Board approved the Girls Inter-Scholastic Athletic Program for 1975-76, and a pilot program in food service.

The Board also announced the District will also participate in the program available through the "Comprehensive Employment and Training Act."



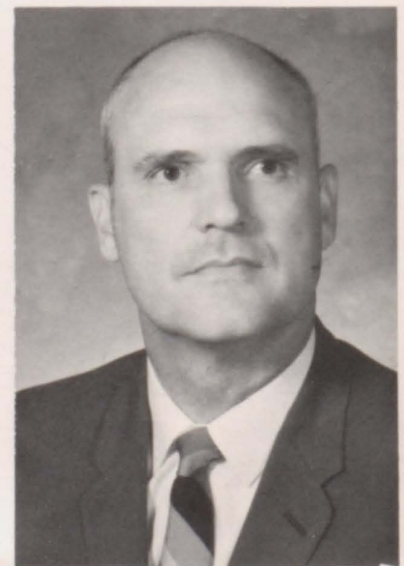

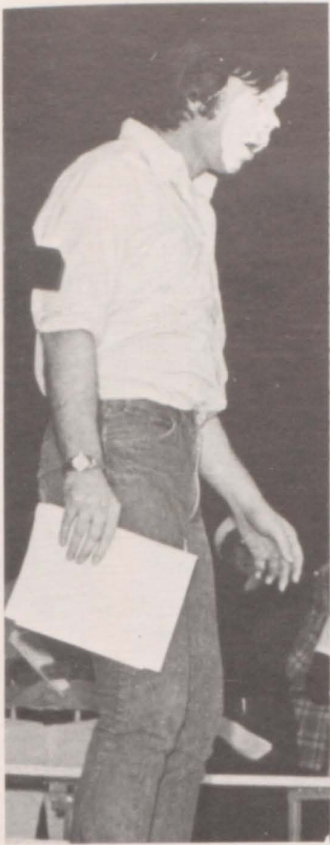

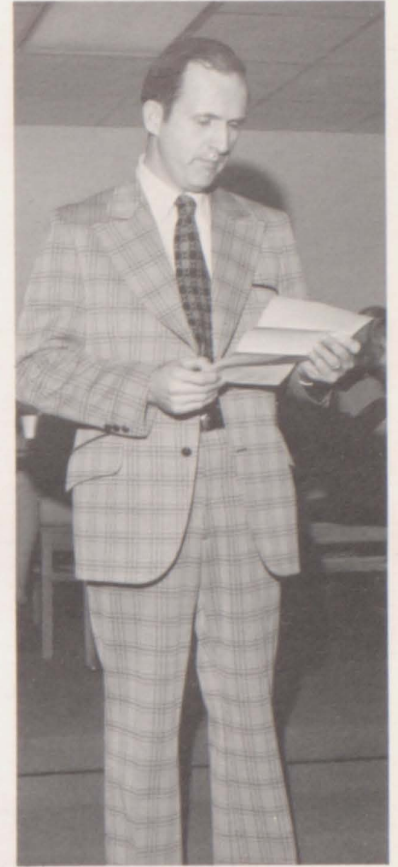

A vital part of the curriculum of WHS, and critically needed by the students are those individuals who work from eight until three o'clock in the guidance office.

All students were assigned to one of four counselors according to the first four letters of their last name. Students are then able to confide in their counselors during their entire three years at Winnetonka. As graduation dreams became reality, the counseling office checked and re-checked to be certain graduation requirements had been fulfilled.

Standardized tests were administered and students were encouraged to consult with their counselors for follow-ups on the results of the tests.

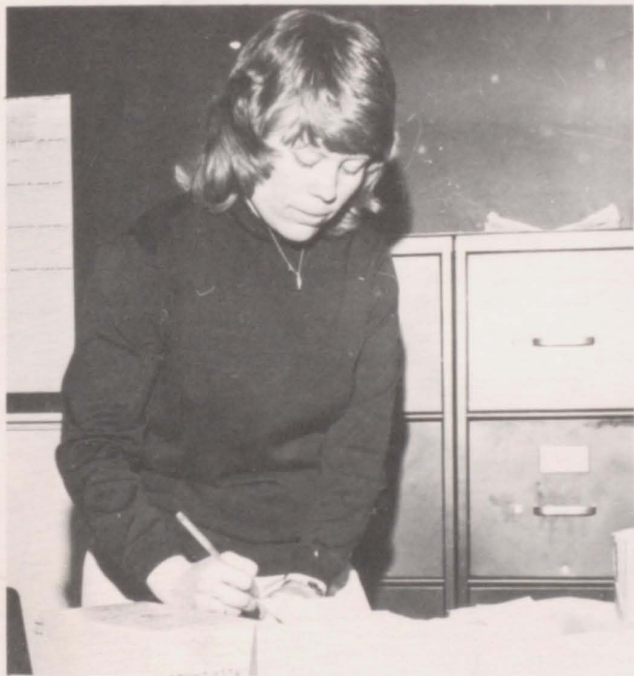

C.O.E. adds selection to a popular course

This year the Cooperative Occupational classes received working experience under the sponsorship of Mrs. Sue McConnell, Mr. Jerry Sutton, Mr. Joe Craft, Mr. Kim McCubbin, and Mr. Larry Downey. There were approximately 300 students enrolled in some type of COE program in the 74-75 school year.

COE was divided into four different groups: trades and industry (T&I), distributive education, office education, and junior COE. Trades and Industry was a planned program to train students in automotive, health, and service occupations. Distributive education was designed for those students who wished to secure training in retail, wholesale, and service establishments. Jobs in Office education varied from bookkeeping to secretarial work which required a daily use for shorthand and typing. These places of employment included banks, insurance companies, and other local industries. Junior COE was a combination of all these occupational programs.

Many students worked through the summer prior to their senior year, worked part-time in their last year in high school, and were ready to go into full-time work upon graduation. Participants in COE watched their own financial status improve as they combined learning with earning.

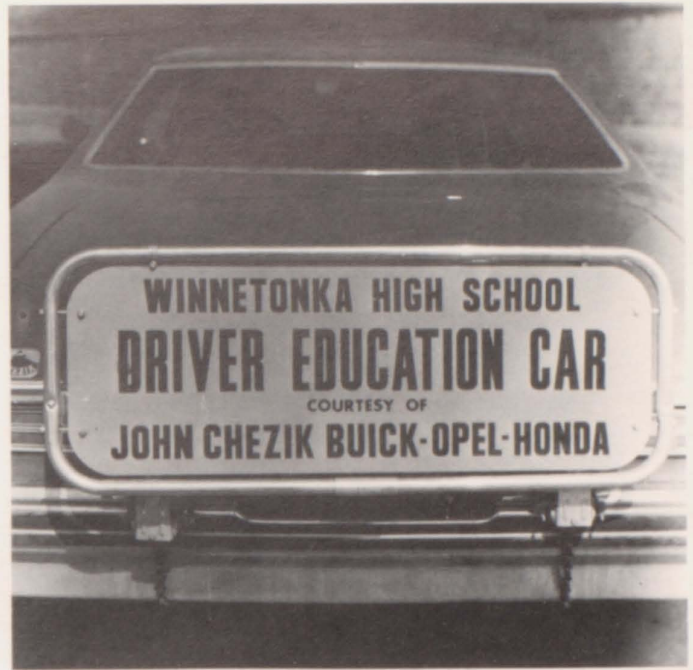

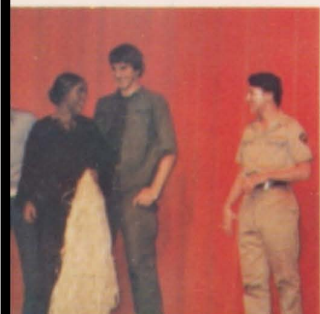

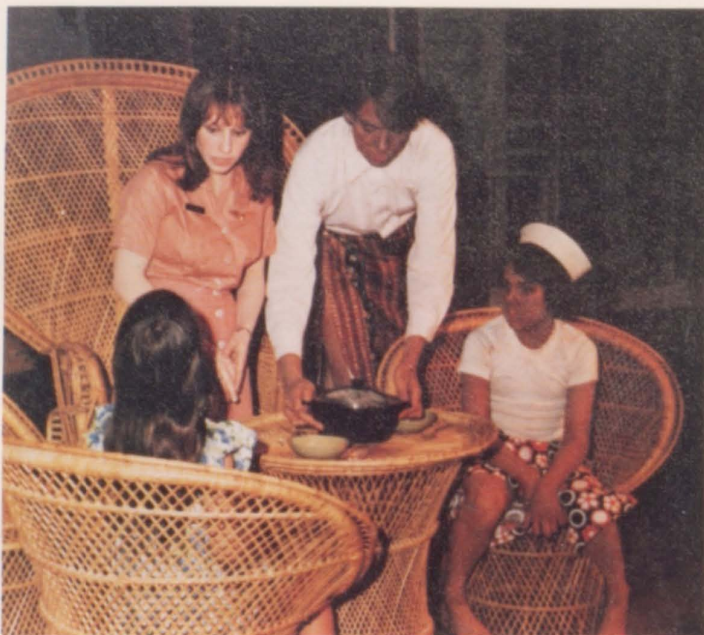

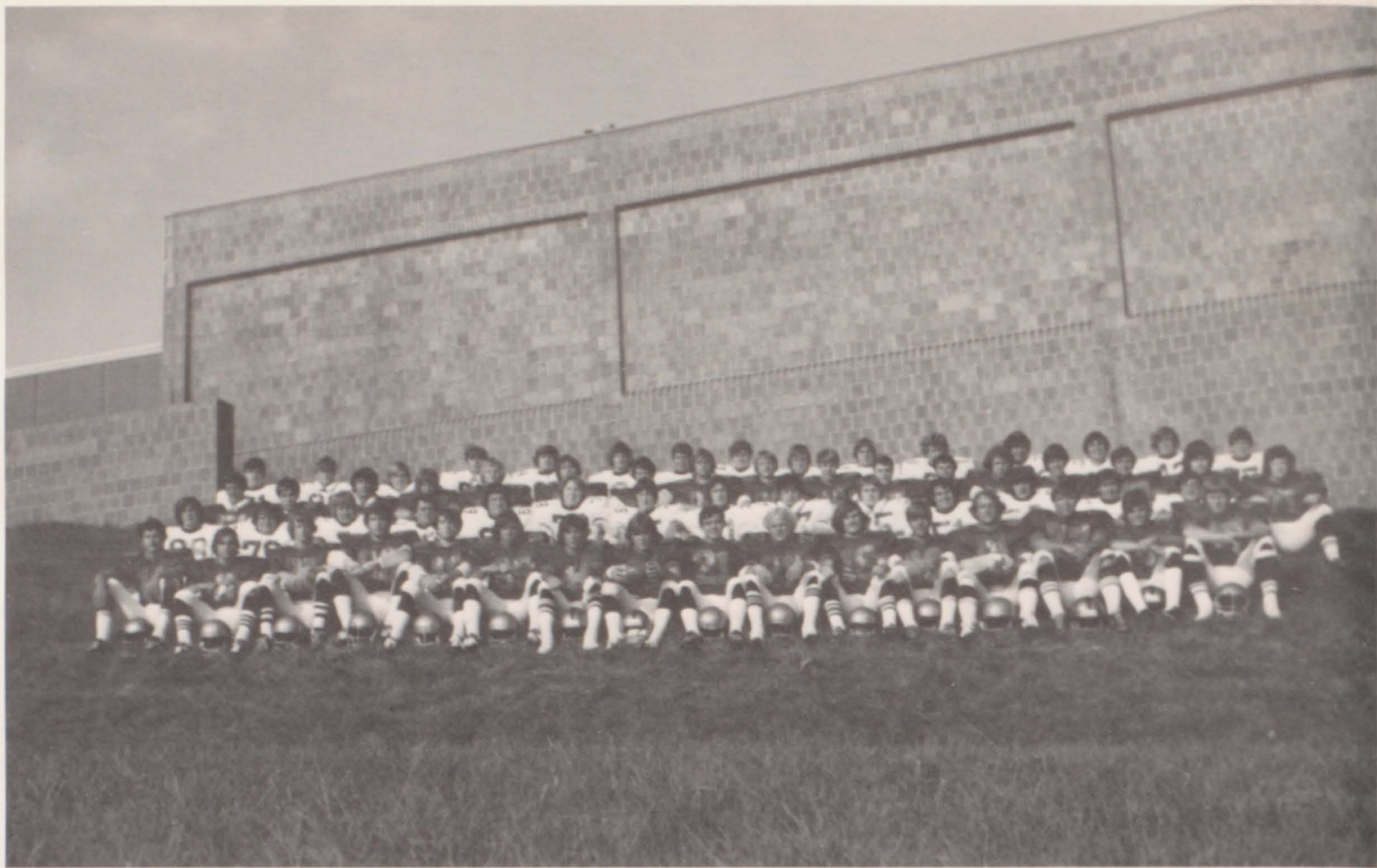

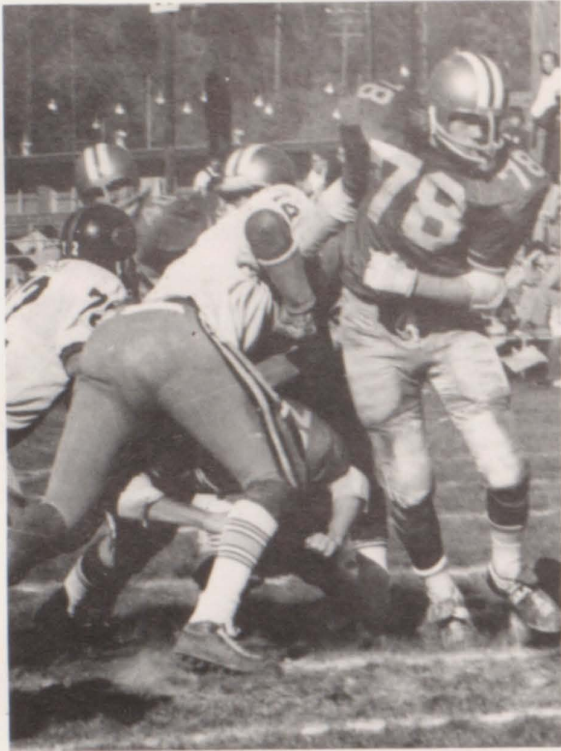

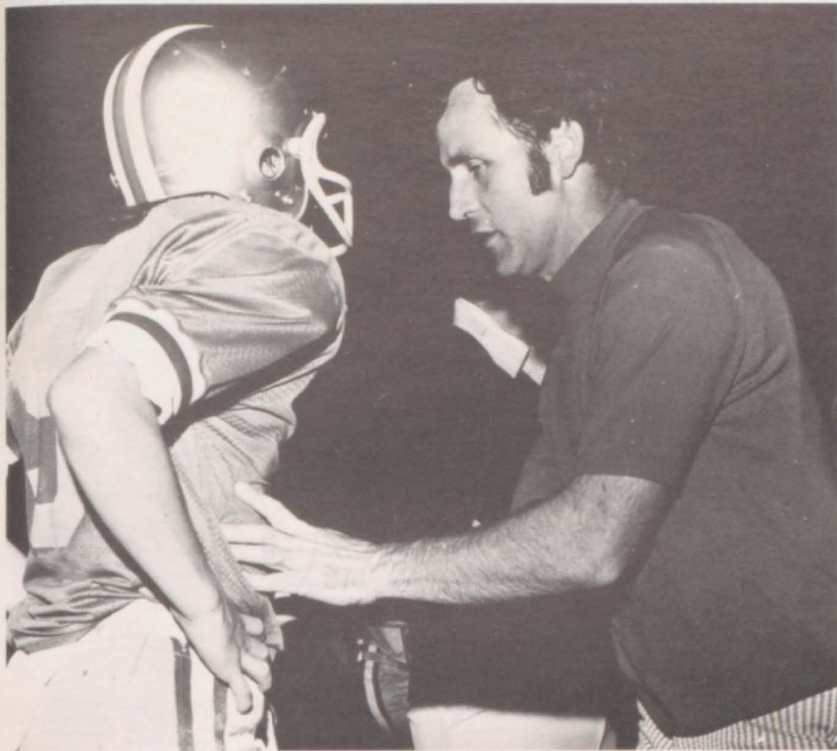
Griffins receive outstanding honors

This year the Griffins were well represented on the All-Conference squad with ten men being honored. These men were selected from hundreds of participating athletes in the Big Six Conference.

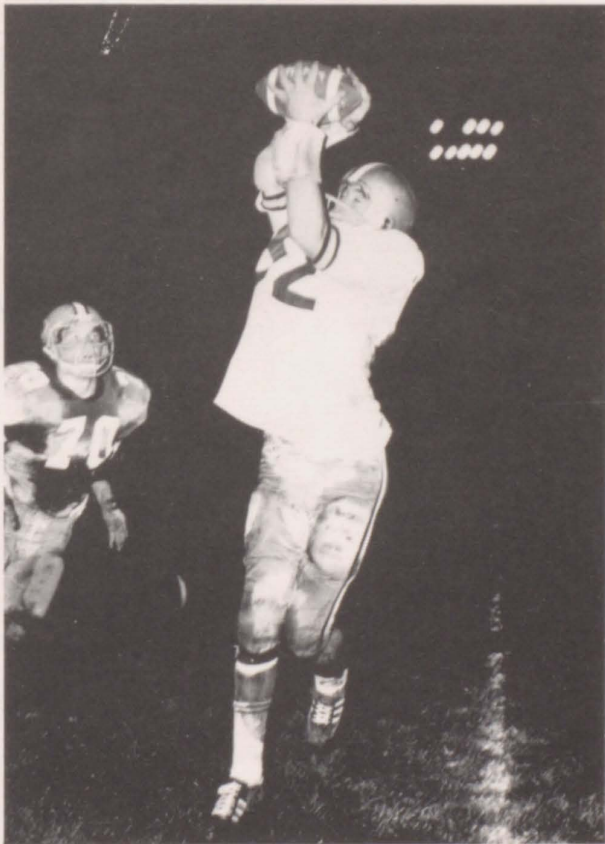

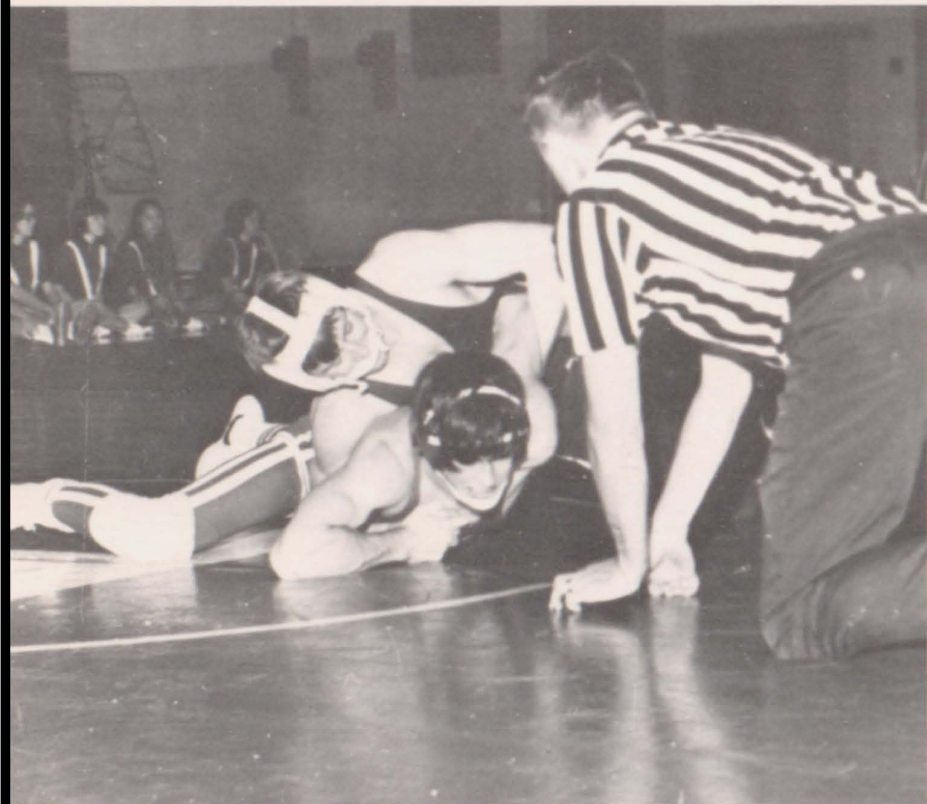
Griffins take Conference and District Tournaments

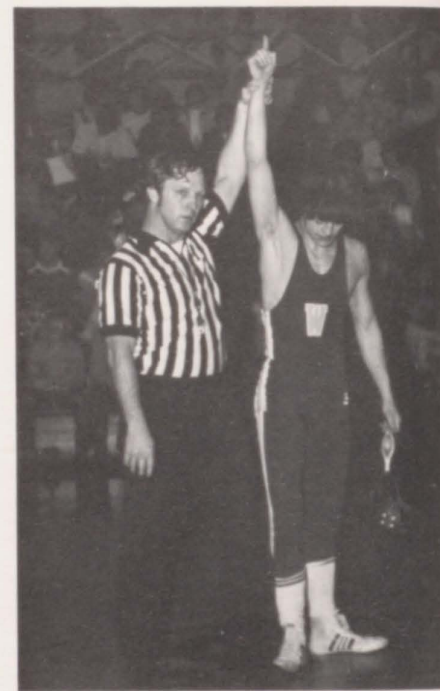
At the regional tournament, the wrestling team carted away second place honors, and also qualified three men for state.

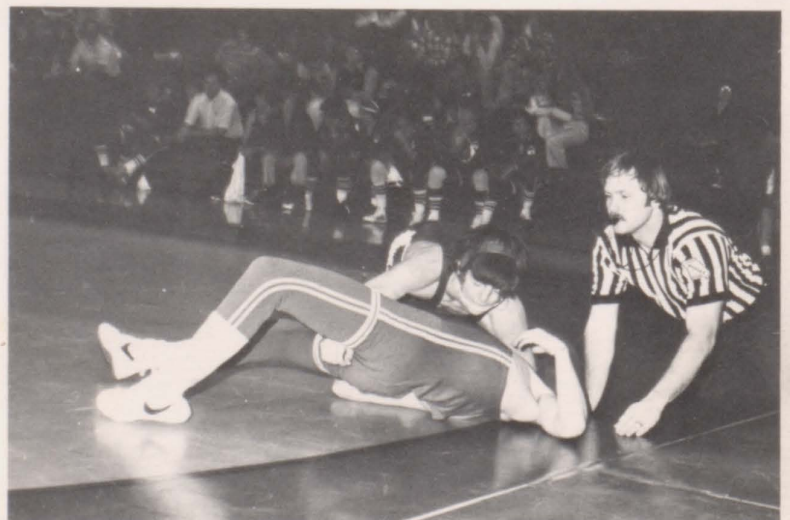

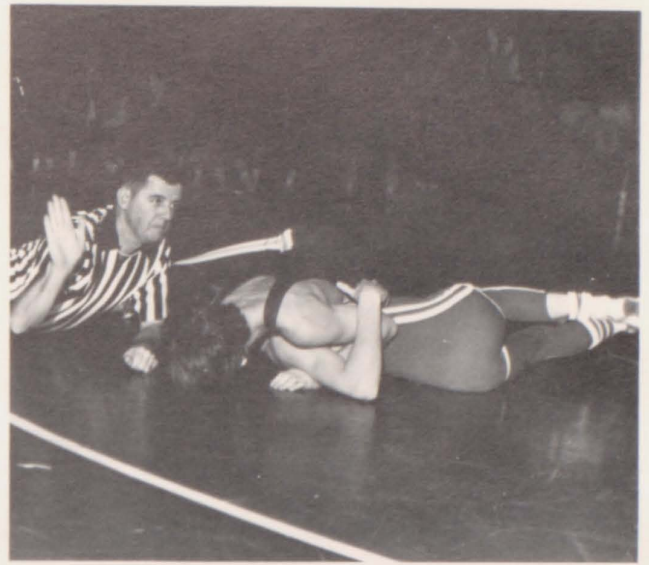

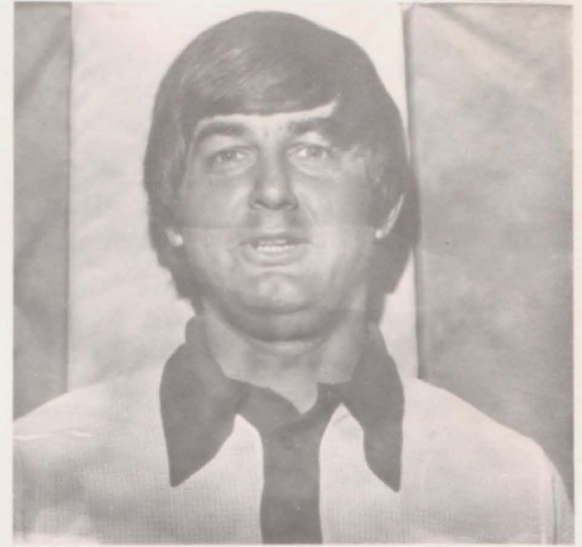

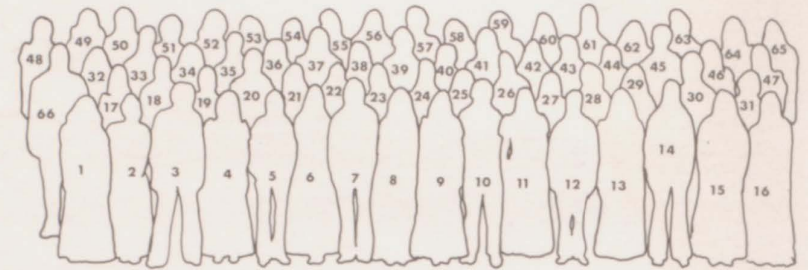
Choral Department entertains audiences
