N E W-J É R S E Y, MAY 16.— SPEECH of his Excellency WILLIAM FRANKLIN, E(q., Captain General, Governor and Commander In Chief, in and over the Province of NEW-JERSEY, and Territories thereon depending in America, Chan-cellor and Vice Admiral of the fame, &c. To the GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the faid Province, Conversed at Builington

Convened at Burlington. Gentlemen of the Council, and Gentlemen of the General Affembly. THE fole occasion of my calling you together at this time is to lay before you a refolution of the Houfe of Commons wilely and humanely calculates, to open a door to the refloration of that barying between Great-Britain and her American colonies on which their mutual welfore and happinges for greatly defend

Great-Britain and her American colonies on which their mutual welfare and happiness fo greatly depend. This refolution, having already appeared in the public papers, and a great variety of interpretations put upon it, moftly according to the different views and difpolitions by which men are actuated and fcarcely, any having feen it in its proper light, I think I cannot at this juncture better andwer the gracious purpoles of his Majefty, nor do my country more effential fervice thas to lay before you as full an explanation of the occafien, purport and intent of it as is in my power. By this means you, and the good people you perefect will be mabled to judge the good people you reprefent, will be enabled to judge for yourfelves how far you ought or ought not to acquiefice with the plan it contains, and what fleps it will be prudent for you to take on this very important occafion

Sociation. You will fee in the King's answer to the joint address of both Houses of Parliament on the 7th of February, how much attention his Majefly was graciously pleased to give to the aflurance held out in that address, of the readiness of Parliament to afford every just and reasonreasonable indugence to the colonies whenever they flouid make a proper application on the ground of any real grievance they might have to complain of. This address was accordingly foon followed by the refolution of the Houfe of Commons now laid before you. A circumof the Houfe of Commons now laid before you. A circum-fhance which afforded his Majeffy grat fatisfaction, as it gave room to hope for a happy effed, and would, at all events, ever remain an evidence of their juffice and moderation and manifest the temper which has accom-panied their deliberations upon that quefilon which has been the fource of fo much diffuiet to the King's fubjects in America.

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
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




















Once in the life time of man comes the return

Looking back on this year you find that the laughter and fun have overshadowed the sadness and boredom. Keeping this fact in mind, you can look with anticipation towards future years.

















































Seniors end one journey ready to begin another

As the leaders of the school, at the end of a long journey, they found Winnetonka to be a part of themselves. They left with the hope that they became a part of Winnetonka.




Although they may be taken for granted by the students, the administration has constantly strived to move forward for the benefit of everyone involved.




Counselors assist students


























Key club adopts a child


Majorettes reveal talents



The 1975-76 football season was a winning year for the Griffins. They finished with a 6-4 record and a share of the conference title.



The next game on the Griffin's schedule was going to be one of the closest games of the season. Truman came out on the short end as Winnetonka coasted to a 34-30 victory.


The next three games were lose games, but the Griffins came away with three victories over Ray South, St. Joe. Central, and Hickman Mills.

The Griffins finished out the season against state power, Jefferson City. The Griffins steamrolled the Jays 34-19 to keep their winning tradition.












Griffins end season victorious













Spoon River is . . . calling you home









To the GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the laid Province, Convened at Burlington. Gentlemen of the Council, and Gentlemen of the General Affembly. THE fole occasion of my calling you together at this time is to lay before you a refolution of the Houfe of Commons wifely and humanely calculates to open a door to the refloration of that harding between Great-Britain and her American colonies on which their much due for and humanels of argenty detend mutual welfare and happiness fo greatly depend. 
